Dear Brother Masfield -

I hope you will be able
to make up your mind to
retain the office of D.P.M.

successor. I may tell you
in strict confidence that my
thoughts are naturally
fixed upon Brother Bristol
& Brother Godson. I myself

have a preference for the
former, for reasons which
you may well understand;
although the latter is no doubt
specially entitled to consideration.
Brother Godson's non-residence
in the Province appears to
be prohibitory, but I consulted
the ^{Rev} Dr. Sampson on the subject
and he does not consider
that this would be a
insuperable objection to
his appointment; at tho

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same time I think that
Brother Brislow claims a
paramount, and his active
service in the Province would
be so valuable to me, that
his health permitting I think
I shall probably decide upon

I have much pleasure in sending for your perusal a Copy of the Resolutions which were unanimously adopted at a Meeting of the acting Provincial Grand Officers, and the Worshipful Masters and Secretaries of the Lodges in the Province, held at Kidderminster, on Thursday last, the 17th inst., at my request.

It was a subject of the deepest regret to me that I was prevented by my duties on an important Committee of the House of Commons from attending this Meeting, and I am anxious to lose no time in reporting to my Brethren what took place, and to invite their hearty co-operation and support to the proposed object. I trust it will be warmly taken up and successfully carried out.

That you may judge of the services which Bro. BRISTOW has rendered to Masonry in the Province of Worcestershire, I append a slight sketch of his Masonic career, and of the offices which he has held; but I would more especially point to his labours on behalf of the Province, and I may add of the Craft in general, in the very faithful and able discharge of his duties as Provincial Grand Secretary for a period of twenty years, and under three successive Provincial Grand Masters.

I need hardly allude to the personal qualifications which so conspicuously fit Bro. BRISTOW for the office he holds in Provincial Grand Lodge, and which have secured for him the position which he occupies in the esteem and regard of every Mason in the Province.

I feel sure that the response to the suggestion which I ventured to make, and which has been already so cordially adopted, will be generally approved, and I trust that the result will be such a recognition of Bro. BRISTOW's merits, as may be equally gratifying to himself and creditable to the Province.

COPY OF RESOLUTIONS.

1.—Proposed by Bro. A. BROWN, P.P.S.G.W., Prov. Grand Treasurer, and seconded by Bro. G. H. WILLIAMSON, W.M., 529, and carried unanimously :—

“ That this Meeting cordially approves of the suggestion of the R. W. Provincial Grand Master that the long and valuable services of Bro. BRISTOW, the Provincial Grand Secretary, should meet with some fitting recognition at the hands of the Brethren of the Province of Worcestershire.”

2.—Proposed by Bro. J. F. ROBERTS, P.J.G.D., seconded by Bro. E. R. HARTLEY, W.M., 252, and carried unanimously :—

“ That in furtherance of this object a Fund to be called the ‘BRISTOW TESTIMONIAL FUND’ be established, and that all the Lodges and Brethren of the Province be invited to contribute liberally to the same.”

3.—Proposed by Bro. R. BROOMHALL, P.G.R., seconded by Bro. J. R. BUCK, P.S.G.D., and carried unanimously :—

“ That a General Committee be formed, with power to add to their number, consisting of the acting Provincial Grand Officers, and the Masters, Treasurers and Secretaries of the several Lodges, and two other Members to be elected by each Lodge, for the purpose of carrying out the foregoing Resolutions.”

4.—Proposed by Bro. A. BROWN, P.G.T., seconded by Bro. W. J. TURNER, W.M., 564, and carried unanimously :—

“ That each Lodge be requested to nominate one of its Members, who may be a Member of the Committee to correspond with the Honorary Secretary, and report to him from time to time as to the progress made.”

5.—Proposed by Bro. BROWN, P.G.T., seconded by Bro. G. H. WILLIAMSON, W.M., 529, and carried unanimously :—

“ That each Member of the Committee be furnished with a Collecting Book to be returnable at the request of the Honorary Secretary, through whom contributions should be forwarded to the Treasurer.”

6.—Proposed by Bro. J. F. ROBERTS, P.J.G.D., seconded by Bro. FITZGERALD, P.P.S.G.D., and carried unanimously :—

“ That the Prov. Grand Treasurer, Bro. ALBERT BROWN, P.P.S.G.W., be appointed Treasurer to the Fund.”

7.—Proposed by Bro. R. BROOMHALL, P.G.Reg., seconded by Bro. J. R. BUCK, P.S.G.D., and carried unanimously :—

“ That Bro. GEORGE TAYLOR, P.J.G.W. (who had, at the request of the Prov. Grand Master, acted as Secretary *pro tem.*) be requested to continue as Honorary Secretary to the Committee and the Fund generally.”

Bro. BRISTOW was initiated in the Harmonic Lodge, No. 252, Dudley, in April, 1851, and was Exalted to the Royal Arch in the Chapter attached to that Lodge in July, 1852.

He filled the Office of W.M. of 252, in 1855 and again in 1868, and has been Secretary of his Lodge from January, 1857, to the present date.

In 1855, Bro. BRISTOW was appointed Prov. Grand Swd. Bearer, and filled the same office in the following year.

He became a Prov. G. Dir. Cer. in 1857, and Prov. G. Reg. in 1858, 1859 and 1860 he was Prov. Grand Jun. Warden, and occupied the chair of Prov. Grand Senr. Warden in 1864 and 1865.

He received the appointment of Provincial Grand Secretary in 1861, and has filled that office to the present time, Bro. DENNISON being *nominally* invested with the Secretary's Collar during the period Bro. BRISTOW acted as P.S.G. Ward.

Bro. BRISTOW has been installed as M.E.Z. of his R.A. Chapter no less than seven times, viz :—in 1858, 1862-63-65-67-69 and 1872, and has filled the second and third chairs quite as often.

It is difficult—from their number—to ascertain how many times Bro. BRISTOW has conducted the Ceremony of Installation in Lodges and Chapters, but in both the Chapters of Dudley he has done so since 1851, and has also assisted other Provinces in this work; the Eytoun Chapter of St. John, Wellington (where for several years Bro. BRISTOW has done the principal work), a few years ago testifying its appreciation of his services by presenting him with a suitable gift, accompanied by Honorary Membership.

This necessarily brief sketch of the services of Bro. BRISTOW in the cause of Craft Masonry—which might be widely extended by alluding to the prominent part he has performed in other Degrees—would not be complete without the record of two recent events which, through his instrumentality have brought credit and honour to his Province.

In June, 1879, he represented the Province as Steward at the Boys' School Festival, when his exertions resulted in his List of Donations being, with one exception, the largest presented, the amount reaching £423 3. 0. This was followed in May, 1880, by his serving another Stewardship on behalf of the Girls' School and taking up a further sum of £364 7. 0.
