



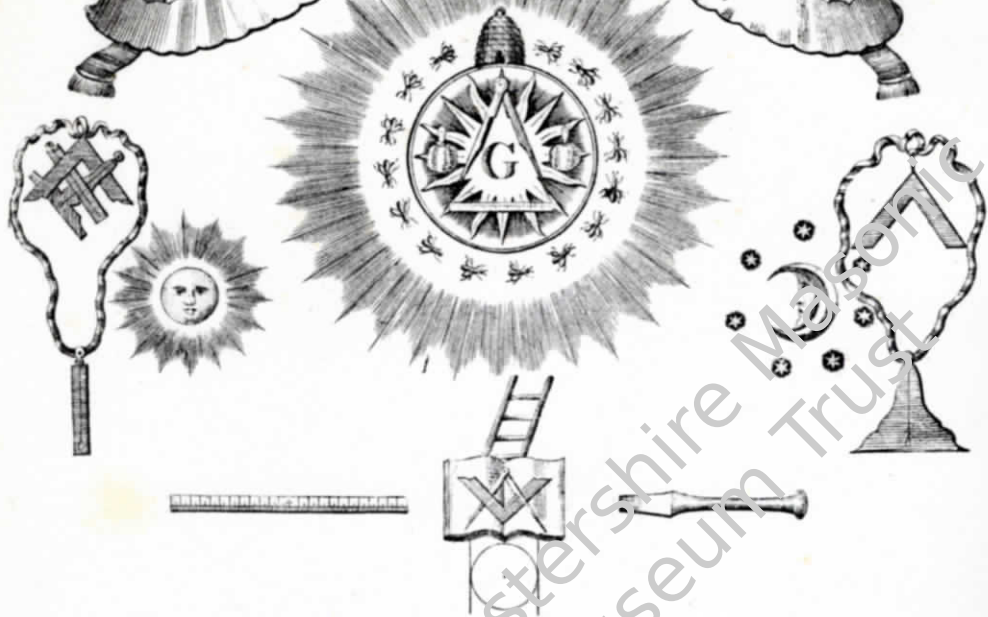

9.—THE LADIES.

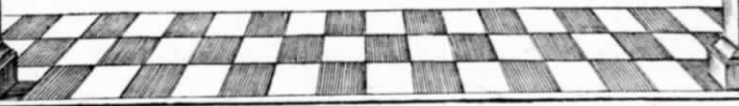
Indeed, and will you Masons ne'er tell tales ?
