SECOND PORTION.

The following Lots having been previously offered, they must be taken with all faults and errors of description, but have been carefully copied from "The Gardening World" and other sources not by permission.

LOT

1. Queen and the Craft.

Although this beautiful rose is called the Empress of India we recognise the bloom as an old favorite under a new name.

2. H.R.H. The Prince of Wales, M.W.G.M.

This is a noble specimen from a fine old stock, suitable for any situation.

3. Pro Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, and Rest of Grand Officers Present and Past.

Grand trees, purple foliage edged with gold; these specimens are unsurpassed in the trade.

4. Prov. Grand Master Sir Francis Burdett, Bart.

We have recently published an illustration of this noble tree as seen from a distance; a nearer view however is required to see the sturdiness and majesty of the trunk and branches.

5. Dep. P.G.M. and the Rest of the Prov. G. Officers Present and Past.

This collection has been selected with great care, and is peculiarly adapted for carpet bedding; some excellent designs have been formed with this.

6. Worshipful Master.

A conifer of medium growth, makes shoots late in spring—of a semi-purple hue—should be transplanted in November.

7. Installing Master.

An early bloomer, free flowering, suitable for forcing, but hardy in a climate like Middlesex—makes growth rapidly—took first prize at Harrow.

8. Masonic Institutions.

These are suitable for exposed situations to protect other plants from the east wind or storms.

9. Initiates.

The only known specimen of *Rex Stephensonensis*, will require attention for next few months, and if shifted twice at intervals of four weeks, will be at perfection in May or June.

10. The Visitors.

These have been recently imported and are a grand variety of *Dendrobium Phalaenopsis* suitable for table decoration, and bloom freely in a genial atmosphere.

11. Past Masters.

Mostly a species of Hornbeam (*Carpinus acerifolia*), slow in growth, suitable for a thick fence and stopping gaps.

12. Officers.

Principally of the genus *Dendrobya Millinivillum Pearsoniensis*. These plants are ready for a good start early in spring—are just now being treated to a mild stimulant—great care should be exercised in their removal.

13. Tyler.

This being a superior specimen of mature growth, arrangements have been made with the L. & S.W.R. Co. for its safe transit by the train leaving Feltham at 10 p.m.
