



Engraved List of Lodges 1737.







History of the Lodge

The details of the early history of St. Paul's Lodge are more or less a matter of conjecture, as there are no records in existence covering the first few years of the life of the Lodge. The earliest recorded minutes are of the year 1764.

There are, however, some well recorded facts in connection with the Lodge and its transactions during the period in question, 1733 to 1764, from which it is possible to draw certain conclusion.

There is no doubt that in the year 1733 a Lodge was founded and met at the Swan Hotel in Birmin ham, and that the Warrant or Letter of Authority, dated August 1st, 1733 under which the Lodge was constituted was issued by the "Moderns." The number of the Lodge was 125, but his number was altered to 109 in 1740 and to 64 in 1756. The List of Lodges in 1740 contains a record as follows:—No. 109. "Swan," Birmingham, last Monday. The Book of Constitutions, 1756 Edition, states in the List of Lodges:—"Swan," Birmingham, last Monday, 1733,

This date is confirmed by the Engraved List and refers to No. 64 "Swan," Birmingham. The "Exposure of Freemasonry," published in 1763, states No. 64 "Swan," Birmingham, last Monday, 1733. In 1764 the Members of No. 64 Modern must have felt that they wished to be allied to both the "Modern" and "Antient"

Grand Lodges, for on the 11th April of that year they obtained a Warrant from the "Antients," the number of which was 124. This "Antient" Warrant was returned to Grand Lodge in 1765.

There is recorded in Grand Lodge a payment on 23rd April, 1764, of £1 3s. 6d. by Lodge No. 64 Birmingham to the "Moderns," being £1 1s. 0d. for Charity and 2s. 6d. for Registration of New Address; this payment is confirmed by an entry in the Minute Book of St. Paul's Lodge under date 27th April 1764. The record for that year of the Lodges meeting in Birmingham includes No. 64 "Moderns" and 124 "Antients" at "Kings Head." Coupling these two records together, the conclusion is that in 1764 the Lodge then No. 64 "Moderns" that was founded in 1733 and met at the "Swan," Birmingham, removed thence to the "Kings Head," Birmingham. On April 17th, 1764 a Lodge of Emergency was held. The Minutes of that Meeting is at as follows:—

"The Wer. Master called this night a Lodge for the first time when the following Brethren met besides his Worshipful—Br. Sketchley, S.W., Br. Freeth, Br. Hensler, Br. Sparrow and Br. Sadler. After Br. Freeth was installed as J.W. and Br. Hensler as Secretary. The Worshipful Master and Senior Warden having been installed by the Grand Secretary Br. Dermot by order of the Grand Master the Lodge proceeded upon business and first a body of Bye Laws was passed according to the Book to be printed."

Lodge accounts of that period show a payment to the Grand Secretary of the "Antients" for the Warrant. It is clear from the early Minute Books that the Lodge was in 1764 and for some years afterwards known as No. 124 and No. 64-that is to sav-No. 124 "Antients," and No. 64 "Moderns." There is abundant evidence in the Lodge Minutes for the next few years that the Lodge was working continuously under both the "Modern" and "Ament" Constitutions. How this was Masonically possible is a puzzle of which the solution has not yet been found. In 1767 there was evidently some feeling with respect to the anomalous position of the Lodge, for in February of that year the "Moderns" Grand Lodge issued a Warrant to the Brethren meeting at the "Kings Head," New Street, Birmingham (Lodge No. 04), naming Ldward Rushton to be Master, James Sketchler to be Sen Warden, and Samuel Freeth to be Junior Warden, "for opening the said Lodge and for such time only as should be thought proper by the Brethren thereof." This Warrant was returned to Crand Lodge in 1822 on the issue of the Warrant of Confirmation under which the Lodge is working at the present ime; it is still in the custody of Grand Lodge. This Warrant of Confirmation finally sets at rest all doubts concerning the year of the foundation of St. Paul's Lodge, No. 43, for it is definitely stated therein that the Lodge was founded in 1733. This is also confirmed by the Centenary Warrant, issued in 1864—the actual date thereof being 5th December, 1864—authorising the Members of the Lodge to wear a Centenary Jewel of special

design. All the Engraved Lists of Lodges, and all Official Publications and Records and Year Books issued by Grand Lodge for the past 150 years, put the year 1733 as the year of foundation of St. Paul's Lodge, Birmingham.

St. Paul's Lodge has had many offshoots, and few Lodges can go back 156 years for their first offspring. On the 7th November, 1777, the Lodge signed a petition for a Warrant for a Lodge of Freemasons to be held in the 6th, or Inniskilling Regiment of Dragoons, who obtained Warrant No. 508 on the 18th December, 1777.

The Lodge also supported the petition of St. Matthew's Lodge, Walsall, Staffs. who received Wayran No. 786 in 1847.

In modern times the Lodge has supported the petitions of at least eight Lodges now neeting in Warvickshire.

In 1784 it was agreed to petition the Grand Master for the name "St. Paul's," and this request was duly granted.

The number of the Lodge has been altered by Grand Lodge from the to time

It has remained No. 43 since the year 1863. The Charity Box now used at all Lodge Meetings has engraved on it the No. 51 and the year 1858.

James Sketchley mentioned above was a most important and influential Freemason in Warwickshire, for it was through his conditional offices that Freemasonry in the Province was organised in a proper manner prior to the formation of a Provincial Grand Lodge in Warwickshire in 1792, when he was appointed the first Provincial Grand Secretary. His portrait was presented to the Lodge in 1792, but was afterwards lost: in 1929 the painting was purchased at a local sale by Bro. Julius Brooks, a present member of the Lodge, and after having been duly identified was presented by him to the Lodge and now hangs in the Library and Museum in this Temple.

Bro. Sketchley and Bro. Freeth are both shown in the well-known portrait of "Birmingham Workhes," painted by Eckstein in or about the year 1790, and which now hangs in Aston Hall, Birmingham.

The Minute Book of the Lodge record several interesting events in the Mason collistory of the Province of Warwickshire.

On March 11th, 1789, a Lodge of Emergency was called to commemorate the happy recovery of King George III from illness. The toast list contains the first reference to the toast of "Our absent Brethren," and a "Complimentary toast to the Visitors."

On June 7th, 1792, a letter was received from Grand Lodge announcing the appointment by the Grand Master of Thos. Thompson, Esq., M.P., as Prov. G. M. for Warwickshire. At the first meeting of Prov. G. Lodge the following members of St. Paul's Lodge were elected to office:—

Bro. Jas. Timmins as Prov. Dep. G. M.

Bro. B. S. Heaton as Prov. G. S. W.

Bro. B. Parker as Prov. G. Treasurer.

Bro. Jas. Sketchley as Prov. G. Secretary

Bro. Rev. Andrew Laurance as Prev. G. Chaplan.

On May 6th, 1803, the sum of £30 10s. 0d. was subscribed by the Brethren to the fund in aid of the Free Church then about to be erected. This was Christ Church, which sood at the top of New Street, and which was demolished in 1897 when Victoria Square was made.

The minutes of September 18th, 1805, record a full description of the Laying of the Foundation Stone of a Public Office in Moor Street, Bilmingham, the V.M. of the Lodge, Bro. Wm. Hollins, being the Architect of the building and acting as Prov. G. Sup. of Weeks.

On, July 7th, 1806, Prov. G. Lodge was held for the first time under the auspices of St. Paul's Lodge.

On December 31st, 1840, for the first time a sum of money was voted from the Lodge Funds to purchase a P.M.'s Jewel.

On 29th November, 1870, the Masonic Hall, New Street, Birmingham was consecrated by Lord Leigh, Prov. G. M. for Warwickshire, assisted by the W.M's. of St. Paul's, Howe, and Faithful Lodges.

In 1927, St. Paul's Lodge was honoured by the Master of the Lodge being chosen to open the door of the Warwickshire Missinic Peace Memorial Temple in Birmingham, at the summons of the Most Wor, the Pro. Grand Master, The Rt. Hon. Lord Ampublic who performed the Opening Ceremony. The Lodge was further honoured by an invitation to hold the first meeting of a Lodge in the Temple. The meeting was held on the 26th September of that year, when the Ceremony of Initiation was performed, Bro. John G. Lines, a son of a member of the Lodge thus being the first Initiate in the new building.

In recent years several members of the Lodge have been honoured by the conferment of Grand Lodge rank. In 1920 the late Wor. Bro. J. Headen Boocock was appointed P.G.St.B., in 1925 the late Wor. Bro. Samuel Abrahams was appointed P.A.G.D.C., and in 1928 Wor. Bro. Pertuam Silverston was appointed P.A.G.D.C.

In 1933 occurs the first celebration, in the Province of Warwickshire, of the 200th Anniversary of the Foundation of a Lodge, and St. Paul's Lodge is very proud that Col. W. F. Wyley, P.G.D., the Provincial Grand Master has honoured it by becoming the Master of the Lodge for this year.
