

A Few Items of Interest.

On a petition being presented to the Grand Lodge of England by Bros. Hope Wood, James Smith, William Briscoe, Henry Harris, Thomas Anslow, Benjamin Call, James Hobbin, and others, all residing at Wolverhampton, a Warrant for a new Lodge to be called the Noah's Ark Lodge, was granted, bearing date November 27th, 1815, and numbered 668 on an Register of the Grand Lodge of England, appointing

for the opening and holding of the Lodge.

EARLY PLACES OF MEETING

1815.—Red Cow Inn, Dudley Street, Wolverhan oton. 1816.—The Noak's Ark Inn, Lichfield Street Wolverhampton. 1819.—The Golden Lion Inn, Salop Street Wolverhampton. 1828.—King's Arms Inn, Bilston.

The first minutes we have any record of commune with Noah's Ark Lodge, No. 668, held at the King' Arms Inn, Biston, June 30th, 1828. Wor. Master Hope Wood in the Chair with proper Officers present; also Bros. Wylde, Fenn and Giles. Messrs. Georg Burch, E. B. Whitehead and Michael Goodall were proposed by Bro Wood, and seconded by Bro. Giles, were balloted for ad douby elected, and initiated into the first degree of Masonry. Thomas Powen, of Biston, Brass Founder, was duly proposed by Bro. George Birch and seconded by Bro. Wood, when on a show of hands it was un ain onsity carried that he should be initiated on the next Lodge night. There were present at this meeting, as visiting Brothers, John Evans, of Fichful Loige, No. 680, Bro. George Hilton, Lodge No. 555, and Reo. William McK ughton, of Lodge No. — It was also proposed by Bro. Wood that these visiting brethren become members of this Locke, und unanimously carried and agreed to by the visiting brethren.

• 1st December, 1828. The Lodge was held at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to celebrat the Festival of St. John the Evangelist. Bro. George Lilton was installed W.M. All business being concluded, the Lodge was closed. The remainder of the day was spent with great pleasure and onvivially and many philanthropic and Masonic Toasts and sentiments, there down, with the honours of Masonry. The Lodge expenses this night were f_{24} 6s. 6d.

13th October, 1830. We received a letter from the Rt. Wor. Prov. Grand Master, Earl Ferrers, stating that he should be at Bilston on the Festival Day, the 30th October, at 1 o'clock, for the purpose of selecting Grand Officers for the County of Stafford.

It was customary at this time to advertise the Meetings of Prov. G. Lodge. The following is a copy from Aris's *Birmingham Gazette*, of 25th October, 1830.

MASONIC.

The Right Honourable Earl Ferrers, Provincial Grand Master for the County of Stafford, intends holding a Provincial Grand Lodge, at the King's Arm's Inn, Bilston, on Saturday, the 30th day of October, at 1 o'clock, to which all brothers are respectfully invited.

Dinner on the table at 4 o'clock.

30th October, 1830. Noak's Ark Lodge, No. 668, held at the King's Arms Inn, Bilston, by command of the Rt. Hon. Earl Ferrers, Prov. Grand Master for the County of Stafford, for the purpose of appointing Prov. Grand Officers for the said County, the R.W. Prov. Crand Master in the Chair, with Prov.G. Officers for the County of Warwick attending The Lodge was opened in form and with solemic prover. Bro. John Tomkys, Junr. was appointed Prov.G. Sec., and Bro. John Dean, Junr. was appointed Prov.G. Treasurer after a ballor, it being carried in the affirmative. They were both members of our Lodge, There were 14 visiting brethren present from Dudley, Stanord and Birmingham. All business being concluded, the Lodge was closed in dro the and perfect harmony, and with a blessing. The maxider of the day was spent in a very friendly and convivial manner, and many Masonic and appropriate Toasts were drank with honours to the Craft, and nit Lordship spoke in the highest terms of the dinner and wines supplied by Miss Tomkys. All the brothers separated, highly or atified with his Lordship's affability and the good entertainment they met with on this interesting occasion.

This is the first record we have of the Provincial Grand Meeting being held in connection with our Longe,

7th October, 1877. On this interine Provincial Grand Lodge was held again in our bodge Room, the King's Arms Inn, Bilston, by the R.W.P.G.M., Earl Ferrers. Bro D. N. Torre, D.P.G.M. for Warwickshire was present. It is to be repreted that the Minutes of this Prov.G.L., Meeting were never entered up, although space in the Minute Book is left for theu.

u₄ti Nevember, r_{31}^{21} . It was unanimously agreed that the sum of \pounds_1 is ad should be paid for wine sent to Bro. John Hilton, who had beet ill-for 12 months, without making any claim on the Lodge. It was the usual practice of the Lodge at this time to send Wine to the Brethren is hey wer ill

12th December, 1831. It was agreed by the Brethren that the usual St. John's Feast be omitted this year, owing to their having had an extra feast and many other unexpected expenses during the past year. This extra feast would be the meeting of Prov. Grand Lodge on the 7th October.

21st August, 1832. A Lodge of Emergency was held at the Fighting Cocks Inn, Goldthorn Hill, near Wolverhampton, in consequence of the alarming sickness prevailing at Bilston, and to propose a donation from the Lodge Funds towards the relief of those poor persons who were, or may be, affected with Cholera. The sum of $\pounds 5$ from the Lodge Funds was given.

16

11th February, 1833. The sum of $\pounds 5$ was given to Bro Hope Wood, our first W.M., to enable him to purchase tools and stock to carry on his business as a tin-plate worker. On this date the number of our Lodge was altered from 668 to 435.

5th August, 1833. Bro. Cheshire, the Treasurer of the Lodge gave a note of hand for the funds of the Lodge, \pounds_{20} , in his possession, and paid 4% interest on the amount

14th July, 1834. A petition was signed for a Warrant for a Lodge at Wolverhampton, to be called the St. Peter's Lodge.

9th March, 1835. It was carried unanimously that two Chars bould be made for the Senior and Junior Wardens, These are it was use.

8th May, 1837. The sum of $\pounds 2$ was sent towards a memorial to be presented to the Most Worshipful Grand Master, His koyal Highness the Duke of Sussex, as a tribute of respect for his invertied everyons to promote the good of Masonry throughout the Kingdom.

9th October, 1837. A petition of thanks and concolence vas forwarded to the Rt. Hon. Earl Ferrers, late Prov.G.M. for Staffordshir, chanking him for the valuable services he had rendered to the craft and expressing deep regret that ill-health should inconstitute him from discharging those duties which he had so honour olv discharged for a series of years, and which they felt satisfied noticing but the great dispensation which the Great Architect of the Goverse in this great dispensation will cause to all, would cause out faithful Bromer to decline the high office he had held with such redit to himselv and benefit to the Craft. This petition was signed by the Brethretvin open Lodge.

12th November, 1836 Dro. George Hilton was made an honorary member of the Lodge rectaving indered great and valuable services to this Lodge in particular and the Grift in general.

3rd April, 1840. There are no minutes from this time until the 11th June, 1841, when 200. James Browley was installed W.M. in the place of our W.M., Brow Thomas Lewis, who had left this country. There are no records from this time, until the 9th October, 1843, there being only 11 members of the Lodge, and regret was expressed to the Grand Lodge that for the want of functions we were unable to subscribe to the Schools, but hoped our members might increase and enable the Lodge to resume its former position.

17th October, 1844. The Lodge decided to purchase Preston's "Illustration of Masonry" for the use of the Lodge, and to be kept in the Lodge for the exclusive use of its purposes. The cost was 8/-.

7th April, 1845. A circular from the Royal Masonic Benevolent Annuay Fund was read showing the Lodge was entitled to 20 votes.

14th May, 1846. Bro. Geo. Hilton was presented by the Lodge with a Provincial Apron.

8th July, 1847. The D.P.G.M., Bro. H. C. Vernon, was introduced in due form and took the Chair. He stated that this Lodge ought to and must have bye-laws, and advised the Lodge to take in the "Free Mason's Quarterly Review". This is the first record of a visit by Bro. H. C. Vernon, D.P.G.M. 12th June, 1848. It was resolved that the Lodge should be removed to the Waggon and Horses Inn, Bilston This was the last meeting at the King's Arms Inn, Bilston.

22nd August, 1848. First Meeting at the Waggon and Horses Inn Bilson; the D.P.G.M. highly approving of the removal of the Lodge to this Place.

12th December, 1848. It was proposed and carried that the following Officers neglecting to attend the Lodge, sending a substitute r dwing the W.M. one day's notice of the same, shall be subjected to the following fines:—the W.M. and Wardens 2/o each; Deacons and Secretary 2/- each; Inner and Outer Guard 1/- each.

16th July, 1849. In consequence of the prevalence of Choleia is an alarming extent in Bilston and neighbourhood, no Lolge was held from this date until November 13th.

toth September, 1850 On account of the continued non-attendance of the Officers and Brethren of this Lodgé it was proposed and carried that the Lodge be discontinued, the Warran, given up to Grand Lodge, and the Lodge Furniture sold to meet the expenses, and that every Brother have due notice of the above proposition in the pex regular summons, so that the opinion of the Brethren of the Lodge may be taken upon so important a subject.

8th October, 1850. It was proposed and carried that the proposition at the last meeting, in reference to the returning of the Warrant to Grand Lodge, should be null and void, as several of the Brethren had promised to attend the Lodge, and would promote its prosperity as far as possible.

11th March 1851. No Lodg, could be held on this date in consequence of the nel-attendance of the W.M., J.W., Secy. and Deacons of the Lodge. Present: Bro Magington. P.M., J. Fox Warner, P.M., Cooper, S.W., and Bro Wright, Tyler. The total number of members at this time was only 8.

oth August, 1253. First Meeting at the Navigation Hotel, Park Leare, Tipton.

31st Jonury, 1854. The Lodge, after this date, commenced to meet in the tord Friday in each month, and has continued to do so since.

6th February, 1855. The R.W.P.G.M., Col. Vernon, and Bro. John Fox Varner, P.M., were elected Hon. Members of the Lodge. Bro Sol. Powell presented a handsome Poinard.

r8th January, 1856. A petition to the Grand Lodge was read praying for the establishment and consecration of a new Lodge at West Bromwich, to be called the Dartmouth Lodge. It was signed by the P.M.'s and Officers who were members of Grand Lodge The R.W.P.G.M., Bro. Lieut. Col. Vernon, was present and congratulated the Secretary, Bro. George Whitehead, upon the neat and excellent appearance of the Minute Book, and, in token thereof, recorded his name therein. 15th April, 1864. The charge for suppers was raised from 1/9 to 2/6 per head, but those who drank Brandy were to pay for it out of their own pockets.

18th March, 1870. First regular meeting held at the Waggon and Horses Inn, Dudley Road, Tipton.

19th May, 1871. An Alms Fund was founded—the box taken roun and 12/- subscribed.

20th April, 1877. The sum of £5 55. was contributed from the Alms Fund to the Shrewsbury Presentation Fund for the Poyl Masonic Institution for Boys.

18th May, 1877. The W.M. referred to the lam moded death of the R.W.P.G.M., The Earl of Shrewsbury, and moved that a vote of condolence and sympathy be sent to the Countess of Shrewsbury and family in their bereavement.

17th January, 1879. The W.M., Bro. C. M. Waring proposed that a suitable Tablet be provided at the expense of the Lodge (similar to the one at St. Matthew's, Walsall, No. 530) recording the name of each W.M., and the year he held the Office room the time, the Lodge came to Tipton (or even from the date of the Warnwe of Lodge, if a true record can be obtained from the elfo Minute Book Loown to the present time and for succeeding years, as that a Chanittee, consisting of the W.M., P.M.'s and Officers of the Lodge be formed to make arrangements and give orders for the same, which was seconded by Bro. Charles Round, P.M., and supported by Bro. Forer, P.M., and carried unanimously.

A Tablet was, provided and Roll of Wor. Masters obtained from the Minute Books of the Lodge. They commence with the name of Bro. John Fox Womer, W.M., 1953. None prior to that date could be found.

19th December, 1879 The sum of \mathcal{L}_{10} 10s. was given from the Funds of the Lodge to the Royal Institution for Girls, the money being sent to the W.D.P.G.M., Bro. G. S. Tudor, on the occasion of his acting as S5 ward at the form coming festival.

17th September, 1880. First meeting at the Star Hotel, Bloomfield, Tipton.

18th February, 1881. A letter was read from the Grand Sec., announcing the appointment by the Most Wor. G.M., of Bro. Geo. Singleton Tudor, as Prov. G.M. for Staffordshire. A vote of congratulation was sent to Bro Tudor.

20th January, 1882. Bro. G. Walton Walker, J.W., No. 1838, paid us a visit.

16th June, 1882. The annual subscription to the Lodge was raised from f_{11} 10s. od. to f_{22} 2s. od.

18th January, 1884. The initiation fees were raised from $\pounds 5$ 55. od. to $\pounds 7$ 75. od., and the joining fee from 15/- to $\pounds 2$ 25. od.

18th April, 1884. The Lodge went into mourning for three months on account of the lamentable death of Bro. His Royal Highness Prince Leopold, Duke of Albany, Knight of the Garter.

18th March, 1887. Bro Thomas Spencer. W.M., of Dartmouth Lodge, No. 662. West Bromwich, applied for the loan of three Chairs and Antique Gavil for the use of the Prov.G. Lodge to be held at West Bromwich, of the 17th May next, which the Lodge unanimously agreed to grant. The D.P.G.M., Bro Foster Gough was present and thanked the Lodge for granting them the loan of the Chairs and Gavil to Prov.G. Lodge

19th September, 1890. A vote of condolence and sympathy with Lady Carnarvon, in consequence of the lamented death of the Rt. Hon. The Earl of Carnarvon, M.W.Pro.G.M., and Prov.G.M. for Somerset was unanimously adopted, and the Secretary was directed to communicate the resolution to Her Ladyship.

19th February, 1892. A vote of condolence was passed with His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. Most Wor. Grant Master, (Eugand.) on the death of his son, the Duke of Clarence and Acondale, K.G. also a letter of condolence to the family of our later, G.M., Col. Fester Gough, deeply deploring the great loss the Province Liss Justainer by ms sudden death.

20th April, 1894. The W.M., on behalf of the members, presented to Wor. Bro G.M. Waring a loving Cup, as a memento of the completion of his 4,th year as a Mason and a member of Noah's Ark Lodge.

yone 5th, 1997. The Rt. Hon. The Earl of Dartmouth installed Rt. Vor Prov. Craid Master at the Annual Meeting of Prov. Grand Lodge, hold at the Arill Hall, Wolverhampton. There were at this time 31 Lodges and 1,348 members in the Province. In this our Centenary year (1915) there are 36 Lodges and 1909 members, exclusive of the members of Foste, Gough Lodge.

20th May, 1898. Congratulations were sent to Wor. Bro. Lieut.-Col. G. Walton Walker, on his appointment to the honourable position as D.P.G.M. of Staffordshire.

20th January, 1899. The sum of ten guineas was given to the Anniversary Festival of the Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution, of which the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Dartmouth had accepted the Stewardship. 16th February, 1900. The sum of ten guineas was voted from the Lodge Funds to the Royal Masonic Institution for Girls, at the annual Festival to be held in May next, under the Presidency of the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Dartmouth, P.G.M., Staffs. A letter was read from the D.P.G.M., Bro. Lieut,-Col. G. Walton Walker, thanking the Lodge for the subscription sent to the Fund raised on behalf of the widow of the late R.W. Bro. Col. G. Singleton Tudor. Bro. G. M. Waring, P.P.G.J.W., was elected an Honorary member of the Lodge. $\pounds 4$ 8s. 6d. was collected from the Brethren and made up to ten guineas from the Lodge Funds, and given to the Masonic Funds in South Africa.

21st December, 1900. It was unanimously resolved that the Lodge's sincere and heartfelt sympathy be conveyed to the R.W.P.S.M. in the loss he had sustained by the death of his mother, the lat Dowager Countess.

15th February, 1901. The Lodge expressed its deep sorroy at the most melancholy event of the lamented death of her larc Most Gravious Majesty Queen Victoria. The W.M. proposed a teaty tote of congratulation to our late M.W.G.M., King Edward the VII, on his accession to the throne.

21st March, 1902. The Lodge subscriptions were raised to $\pounds 2$ ros od, per annum, payable half-yearly in advance, the fee for Initiation to ten guineas, and the Joining fee to three juineas.

18th April, 1902. A most interstong event in the history of the Lodge took place this evening. The D.P.C.M. Lieut.-Col. G. Walton Walker, and 21 visiting Brethren were present. The D.P.G.M. presented P.M's Jewels to 14 P.M's of the Lodge which had been readily and willingly subscribed for by the Brethren. In making the presentation, the D.P.G.M. referred to be Mithful and valuable services rendered to the Lodge by the P.M's and their appreciation by the Brethren, as was shewn by the handsome and valuable Jewels they had handed to him to present on their behalf.

18th Dece, ber, 1903. A etter of condolence was sent to the family of our late 200. G. M. Waring, P.P.G.J.W., who was Initiated in this Lodge on the 12th June, 1053, and made an Hon. Member on the 16th Februar, 1000, for his long and valuable services.

6th June, 1005 A Circular was read from Prov G. Lodge, requesting the members of the Lodge to attend the Ceremony of the laying of the Foundation Store of the Nurses Home, the Hospital, West Bromwich, by the R.W.P.G.M. the Earl of Dartmouth, with Masonic Ceremonial, on Monday, the roth July next. The sum of five guineas was voted to the Home.

17th May, 1907. The sum of 20 guineas was voted to the Royal Masonic Institution for Boys, for the endowment of the S.W.'s Chair.

16th December, 1910. First meeting at the Royal Oak Hotel, Dudley Port.

19th May, 1911. The sum of $\pounds 26$ 5s. was voted to the Royal Orphanage on opening the new wing. 26th February, 1914. Wor. Bro. Joseph Whitworth proposed that the Lodge take into consideration the question of inviting to Noah's Ark Lodge the Prov. Grand Lodge for 1916, and also the question of making application to Grand Lodge for Centenary Warrant, seconded by Wor. Bro. Richard Mason, and carried unanimously.

20th March, 1914. Wor. Bro. Joseph Whitworth proposed that the Lodge petition the Grand Lodge of England to grant to this Lodge a Centenary Warrant on the 27th day of November, 1915, empowering the members thereof to wear a Centenary Jewel, in conformity with the regulations of the Order, which was seconded and carried unapimously. He also gave an excellent and interesting resumé of the records of this Lodge from its earliest period to the present. Bro. J. E. Loudey proposed a hearty vote of thanks to Wor. Bro. Joseph Whitworth for the ability and care he had given in collecting the details for the Centenary Petition, seconded by Wor. Bro. Hamblett. and carried unanimously. The Secretary read a letter from the Prov. Grand Sic. acknowledgag the receipt of a petition for Prov. Grand Lodge, to be held at Tipton in 1916.

15th May, 1914. The Wor. Master announcer that the United Grand Lodge of England had been pleased to gran to chis Lodge. Centenary Warrant.

15th May. 1914. On the proposition of Wor. Br. Walter Hamblett, seconded by Wor. Bro. George Buder and suppored by several other brethren, it was unanimously resoned. That the most cordial thanks of the W.M., P.M.'s, Wardens aud Brethren of Noah's Ark Lodge, be tendered to Wor. Bro. Joseph Whitworth, J.P.G.S.D., P.M. No. 347, for his successful efforts in obtaining the sale from of Grand Lodge to grant a Centenary Warrant to our Lodge, No. 347.

18th September 10.4. In accordance with notice given, Wor. Bro. Joseph Whitworth, proposed that the sum of \pounds_{31} 10s. od. be granted from the Lodge funds in aid of the Prince of Wales War Relief Funds, seconded by the W.M., and carried unanimously. It was further resolved that a cheque be drawn forthwith and forwarded to the Prov. Grand Lodge of Staffordshire.

28th September 1915. A letter of sympathy and condolence was sent to The Rt. Wer. P.G. Master; the Countess of Dartmouth, and then family, on the death of Capt. The Hon. Gerald Legge, who lost his life while on the service in the Gallipoli Peninsula. Although severely wounded, he refused to leave his post and died there, playing the game to the end, fighting and dying for the honour of his King and Country. No one could have done more. May his soul and the souls of all such brave meaning peace and eternal rest.

28th September, 1915.
