



CONSECRATION OF THE LODGE OF BON ACCORD No. 4935

The consecration of the Lodge was held in the Masonic Hall, SteChard, on September 29th, 1927 at 2.45 p.m. The Signature Book contains the names of seventy two brethren from this and other Lodges and Provinces who were present to support the Consecrating Officer, the Provincial Grand Master for Worcestershire, The Right Worshipful Brother General Sir, Francis J. Flavies. This number included fifteen Founder Members.

The First Master, Worshipful Brother James Mitchell, P.M. 3185, was duly installed into the Chair and proceeded to appoin his Officers.

It was at this First Ceremony that it was projected that the Lodge of Bon Accord, No. 4935 qualified as a Hall Stone Lodge and in course of time the Collarette and Jewel were presented at the Scotember 1928 meeting of Provincial Grand Lodge in Birmingham.

Temple Lodge, No. 48.29, in the Masonic Province of Warwickshire, was consecrated on the same only in the new Tomple, Broad Street, Birmingham, and the following telegram was sent tooks burst Master, Worshipful Brother Wilfred Allen.

"Hearty greetings and congratulations from the Founders of Lodge of Bon Accord, No. 935, Worcestershire, consecrated today, and desiring intervisitation acquaintance (signed) Mitchell, W.M."

September 30th caw confirmation from the Temple Lodge also desiring and indeed applicating the proposed intervisitation and this exchange between the rodges continues to this day.

The business of the evening was finalised by the proposing of the first five candidates for Initiation into the Lodge and the first two Joining Members.

They were Messrs. Sydney Heath, W. T. R. Nixey, E. W. Jones, W. J. Boffin, and A. E. Lythall and Brothers G. Rowell and W. R. Dewsbury.

The first Charity Box contained the sum of £7.

AN ABRIDGED HISTORY OF THE LODGE OF BON ACCORD No. 4935

1927 - 1977

Reading through the Minutes of every Lodge Meeting for the past fift years can become a most absorbing occupation, but however enthusiastic or might be, a mere repetition of extracts taken from the Minute Books might well fail to hold the interest of the reader.

Whilst presenting the facts in chronological order, an endea our has been made to tell an interesting story. From the Lodge Minutes and other Masonisources, it has been possible to verify the correctness of these records and everything of a doubtful origin has been omitted.

There are occasional gaps in the sequence of events. These gap

by uneventful years, leaving little of note to record.

It cannot be denied that the times in which we live have been marked by a scientific and social revolution in our midstrand in our namer of living. Remembering this, is it not a comforting the gent that the tesets and principles of Freemasonary remain unchanged.

FIFTY YEARS ON

1927/1928.

W. Bro. Mitchell distinguished himself In his first rather extended year, by achieving in 15 Regular and Energency Meetings a total of 10 Initiations, 10 Second Ceremonies and 7 Thir Ceremonies. At one Emergency meeting, he worked 2 Second and 2 Third Ceremonies. Indeed, a stenuous year, but a year with the express purpose and tim of building up the Lodge and establishing high Masonic standards of a variand behaviour.

October (th. 928, the Lodge Banner was presented to the Lodge by Bro. E. Newton a Founder Member, to mark his high esteem and regard for his f the r-ip-law, Mr. White, of "Bon Accord", Yardley. An explanation of the Barner is given in the Labour of the Jubilee Meeting.

Thus concluded the first year of the Lodge of Bon Accord, with a list of 25 subscribing brethren, showing remarkable evidence of virility and strength under the leadership of an outstanding personality in Freemasonry, Bro. G. H. Fisher was initiated during the year.

1929.

W. Bro. E. Egerton-West followed W. Bro. Mitchell into the Chair.

On February 12th., the I.P.M., W. Bro. Mitchell presented the Lodge with the I.P.M's chair.

In this second year of the life of the Lodge, on November 2nd., at the 16th. Meeting, W. Bro. A. V. Bollins was initiated into the Lodge.

And so, with 7 First, 4 Second and 6 Third Ceremonies performed in 7 Regular Meetings and 3 Emergency Meetings, W. Bro. Egerton-West was certainly emulating the standards set by W. Bro. Mitchell.

1930.

Bro. J. Harris, S. W., now attained the Chair. In 7 Regular and 1 Emergency Meeting, 5 Initiates were admitted during the year, with a total of 14 ce emonies being conducted.

1931.

In the January of this year, Bro. H. Edwards was installed as the Fourth Worshipful Master of the Lodge. It was he who initiated W. Bro. G. H. Budd, on an Olde English Night, held on December 5th., the 36th. Regular Meeting of the Lodge.

Two further candidates were admitted during this year

1932.

This year saw the introduction of a most elaborate Installation Booklet and Menu set on the Festive Boar. The Installation of Bro. J. E. Winterbottom was conducted with great ceromony and are wards the Brethren sat down to the following menu (Cost 5/6d per head!).

In a quiet and consolidating year of 7 Regular and 1 Emergency Meeting 10 Degreee ceremonies were worked including 3 Initiations.

1933.

With Bro. D. H. James in the Chair, there occurred the deaths of two of the Lodge's Honorary Members, namely, W. Bro. W. Summers and W. Bro. P. Perry.

During his term of Mastership, W. Bro. James conducted 3 First Ceremon es.

1934.

The comparatively quiet pattern of recent years continues, who the W. M. Bro. F. W. White, admitting 3 Initiates.

It was on the 1st. December, at the 52nd. Regular Meeting of the Todge that the father and uncle of W. Bro. S. W. Bloxidge were initiated. This year also saw W. Bro. Frank Shaw, father of our present 1.2M, W. Bro. Shaw joining the Lodge, having been a member of an American Lodge.

1935.

Bro. G. Barton now succeeded to the Chair, and one of his first Initiates was W. Bro. R. Shaw, who entered the Looge on the 2nd February, the 54th. Regular Meeting.

Letters of congratulation were sent from the Lodge to The R. W. Bro. General Sir Francis J. Davies on his being appointed as Deputy Grand Master.

Three First Ceremonies took place this year

1936.

The Minutes of the 60th. Meeting, an Installation Meeting, and those of the 61st. Meeting are missing from the Minute Book which was severely damaged by fire in 1967. However, the Minutes of the 63rd. Meeting show Bro. S. Dunn-Toon in the Char.

The year was marred by the death of His Majesty King George V.

Jn what appears to have been a strenuous year for Bro. S. Dunn-Toon, in 7 Regular Meetings and 2 Emergency Meetings he carried out 2 Initiation ceranionies, one of the initiates being Bro. J. C. A. Monkhouse.

1)37.

Bro F. W. Jones was installed by W. Bro. S. Dunn-Toon.

The 69th., 70th., 71st., and 72nd. sets of Minutes are missing from the badly scorched Third Minute Book. The Fourth Minute Book commences with the 73rd. set of Minutes, of a meeting held on December 4th. In the Labour of the Lodge, the candidate for election was W. Bro. F. J. Johnson.

The W. M. initiated 3 candidates during his year of Office.

With Bro. A. E. Sparkes in the Chair, the pattern of recent years continues. However, the war clouds were gathering and in the August, an important notice was issued by Grand Lodge to all the Craft.

The document emphasised the fundamental principles of the Order. It warned against other Bodies, styling themselves Freemasons which did not adhere to our Principles. The document ended with these words:—

"Our principles must be accepted wholeheartedly and in their entirety by those who desire to be recognised as Freemasons by the United Grand reage of England".

Two initiates were admitted into the Lodge.

1939.

W. Bro. Sparkes now installed Bro. A. E. Lythall a his successor.

In view of the National Emergency that in dasisen, Grand Lodge suspended all Masonic Meetings, but later in the month of September, the suspension was lifted and the resumption of Meetings permitted, for, as the Grand Secretary wrote at the time:—

"No one can lose sight of the fact that kreemasonary enters into the lives of so many that the interruption of meetings yould not only cause personal hardship but a loss of inspiration to a consider ole part of our Nation".

"Rook of Constitutions" were relaxed. It was laid down

Many rules of the "Book of constitution," were relaxed. It was laid down that Meetings may not be held our Sunday, that morning dress or uniform may be worn, that meetings should be arranged for as early as possible, that any 'after proceedings' should be as brief and imple as possible, etc.

At the 81st, Meeting of the Lodge, W. Bro. R. J. Taylor was elected and initiated into the Lodge. A large number of the Lodge remember him with affection

The 86th. Meeting, hald on November 4th, saw W. Bro, S. W. Bloxidge as a candidary for initiation.

Doring his year the Installation of the Grand Master, HRH The Duke of Kent K. G., took place at Olympia, Kensington, London, on the 19th. July.

In the first months of the War, the W. M. conducted 7 ceremonies, neluding 2 languages.

1940

So far, in spite of war conditions, under the Mastership of Bro. W. J. Boffin, the Lodge maintained a good level of attendance.

Grand Lodge announced that the children of Freemasons now evacuated from this country had been received into the homes of Freemasons in the countries to which they had gone.

For the W. M., this was a quiet year in which he initiated one candidate.

1941.

Inclement weather, travelling difficulties with "black-out" conditions did not help attendance at Meetings. However, a special appeal was sent out by the W. M., now Bro. J. H. Owen, for all Brethren to make the effort to attend the 100th. Meeting of the Lodge, held on 1st. November. The appeal was successful and a goodly number of Brethren and Visitors attended.

Bro. J. Herriott, now residing in Wales, joined the Lodge.

Three Initiates were admitted into the Lodge.

1942.

At the 102nd. Meeting, held on January 3rd., in the Third Year at the War, W. Bro. A. V. Bollins was installed in the Chair. At the time, W. Bro. S. W. Bloxidge, was Lodge Organist and W. Bro. G. H. Budd, Steretary.

At the l06th. Meeting of the Lodge, news come through that the Grand Master, The Most Worshipful Brother Air Commodore HRH The Duke of Kent, K. G., had been killed in action.

The final meeting of the W. M's. year saw congratulations from many esteemed Masons on the work done from the Chair in 7 Regular Meetings and 1 Emergency Meeting, which included 2 First Cerepones.

An increased amount of Charity Monies was raised for the upkeep of the Masonic Schools and £32 was dorived to the Masonic War Relief Fund.

1943.

At the Installation of Bro. W. Towler, the Lodge was honoured by our Founder Worshipful Water being invited by the Province to act as Presiding Officer at the Installation Ceremony.

About the time the old Mi) ute Books went missing, feared lost by enemy action. These books were later recovered, having been in the safe keeping of Brother Tyler.

The Brothen beard a number of lectures and saw 3 ceremonies conducted, one of which was a First Ceremony.

1944.

Again, W. Bro. J. Mitchell officiated as Presiding Officer when Bro. H. Paxton-Newton-Mason was installed.

At the March Meeting in this year, W. Bro. S. Dobson-Hopper was initiated. Whittington Barracks had been taken over by the American Forces and a number of the visitors to our Lodges were American and Commonwealth Masons. It is noted that two American Servicemen were admitted to the Lodge. They were Bro. J. Barnes and Bro. A. Rawlings.

Four candidates were initiated this year.

1945.

In this last year of the War, W. Bro. G. H. Budd succeeded to the Chair. A Directive was issued from Grand Lodge countermanding the Directions issued to the Craft in September 1939. Other Directives followed, concerning qualification for Initiation, special conditions and arrangements for returning members serving with H. M. Forces, the difficulties experienced by Brettren serving abroad, and so on.

Thus Masonry was becoming stabilised again and by virtual these Directives, returning to normal very quickly.

Indeed, a most satisfying end to W. Bro. Budd's Mastership Univing Conducted 8 ceremonies, two of which were First Ceremonies.

1946.

Bro. C. E. Wood now attained the Chair, and at the 133rd. Meeting of the Lodge, held on April 6th., the Master received a tepperation from the Promoters of the proposed Lodge of Yardley. Led by the Master Designate, W. Bro. A. V. Bollins, the petition was signed and the new Lodge of Yardley wished success by the W. M. and the Brethren.

The W. M. in his year of Office indiated 2 candidates.

1947.

Bro. Lt. Colonel R. Galdsborough, OBE, now succeeded to the Chair. The October Meeting noted a letter received from H. R. H. Princess Elizabeth thanking the Lodge for the message of congratulations sent to her on the occasion of her Cls. ourthday. The message came from South Africa where Her Royal Highness was on a Royal Your.

The Master conducted ceremonies, two of which were Initiation ceremonies

1948

Bro. B. Furnis was installed as W. M. It was in this year that W. Bro. J. Mitchell retired as Almoner and W. Bro. D. H. James took over. Acknowledgement for the sterling charity work of W. Bro. Mitchell, as Almoner, poured in frontall quarters.

At No. 21st, celebration of the Founding of the Lodge, held on October 2nd., a special item was included in the Labour of the Lodge, "to read extracts from the Minutes of the Consecration Meeting, held on Thursday, September 27th, 1927, at the Masonic Hall, Stechford".

These extracts were read out by the first W. M. of the Lodge. He stated that the Lodge of Bon Accord was the first to be consecrated in the present building and that the consecration took place on the 30th, anniversary of his initiation and that the 29th. September of this year had seen the 51st, anniversary of his initiation.

He also paid tribute to the quality of the work of the First Secretary W. Bro. J. Harris.

At this meeting, it was pleasing to note that all five of the surviving Founder Members of the Lodge were present, namely — W. Bro. J. Mitchell, W. Bro. J. Winterbottom, W. Bro. D. H. James, W. Bro. S. Dunn-Toon and Bro. E. Matthews.

At the November Meeting, a letter was read out to the Lodge from their Royal Highnesses, Princess Elizabeth and The Duke of Edinburgh, thanking the Lodge for the best wishes offered them on the birth of Prince Charles.

During this exciting year, the W. M. initiated two canidates, on of whom was Bro. T. N. F. Edwards, and who is now a Country Member.

1949.

Bro. F. Shaw now reached the Chair with his blood prother Bro. 2. Shaw as Secretary.

W. Bro. E. W. Underwood, was initiated at the 155th. Meeting held on 1st. October, and was the first of two candidates idmitted turing the year.

1950.

In the year that W. Bro. S. Dupn from was appointed as Assistant Provincial Grand Master for the Province of Worce tershire, Bro. L. Yates was in the Chair.

W. Bro. G. H. Budd was elected Treas and of the Lodge on November 4th, and joined the Board of Directors of the Stechford Masonic Lodge Co.

W. Bro. J. Mitchell cojoyed tributes paid to him on the occasion of his Golden Wedding.

Two candidates was accepted into the Lodge.

1951.

The Deputy Proviccial Grand Master, W. Bro. Dr. E. L. Bunting was the Presiding Office at the Justallation of Bro. R. Shaw.

Two well known Prethren of the Lodge were initiated in this year. These were nro. J. Oabrey, and the late W. Bro. A. G. Jennings.

The year was marred by the death of W. Bro. S. Dunn-Toon.

1952.

At the 174th, Meeting, under the Mastership of Bro. J. C. A. Monkhouse, the death of the Sovereign and Past Grand Master H. M. King George V1, was reported.
