Foreword.

HE Compilation of the History of the Lodge of Perseverance No. 573 has been simplified by the fact that there are at our disposal the complete records of the Lodge since its inception and our grateful thanks are due to the twenty-five secretaries, who so carefully recorded the minutes of their Lodge meetings and zealously preserved the minute books entrusted to them. Tribute must also be paid to our present Secretary Wor. Bro. G. N. Raybould who has in addition to his ordinary duties carefully and painstakingly compiled this record which serves as the key to the past. We are also indebted to the family of the late Wor. Bro. William Waldron whose ready co-operation has made available for inspection his personal masonic jewels and who have presented to the Lodge copies of the summonses it issued between the years 1875 and 885. In those days the summons was printed in octavo paper and many are the variations in yle adopted by successive W.M.s. Reference is to be found) therein of the proposals to more the Ledge from the Shenstone Hotel to the Drul Hall at 4 to change the date of meeting to the second Ta sday in the Month and in other respects this gift has helped to open what her been a closed door for many years. It is interesting to note that in those leisurely days ther were a number of M etings at which the only business to be transacted was the reading of the Minutes and the receipt of subscriptions which apparently engaged the brethren for some two hours.

On the contrary the Industry of our force cars is illustrated by the frequent occasions when more than one ceremony was conducted at the same meeting and it is recorded that on the 15th Fovember, 1883 Wor. Bro. Waldron performed two Raisings, three Passings and an Initiation ceremony which, with other business occupied birn from 4.0 to 7.45 p.m. It is worthy of record that the only officers then elected by the breakren prior to installation were the W.M., the Treasurer and the Tyler, whereas at the present time there are five other elections of breakren to act as Charity Steward and to serve on various Committees.

It is a matter of conjecture whether the passing of time has seen any improvement in the standard or the quality of our Masonic work, for the time saved by such inventions as the telephone and the motor which may have been devoted to masonry, must to a large extent have been absorbed by the contemporary advent of the cinema and the radio. Whatever the consensus of opinion on this point it appears to the writer that although the Lodge may gain fame and prestige from its antiquity, Freemasonry can never grow old. It may have been presented by our ancient Brethren in forms different from that in which it is known at the present day. But since it stands for things that are eternal it is ever young, and it responds today to the call of human nature and the needs of the heart just as readily as it did a century R.S.G. ago.

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Formation of the Lodge.

Several Brethren, belonging to the Antient Order of Free and Accepted Masons, resident in Dudley feeling anxious that a new Lodge should be established, caused the necessary Petition to be prepared and signed, as required by the Book of Constitutions under the sanction of the Worshipful Master and Wardens of the Harmonic Lodge No. 313 and the same was forwarded to the Right Worshipful Brother Roden, D.P.G.M. for the Province of Worcestershire, who obtained the necessary Warrant or Charter from the Grand Lodge of England.

The following are Copies of the Petition and Warrant.

Copy of Petition.

"To the M.W. Grand Master of the United Fraternity of Antient Free and accepted Macons of England."

"We, the undersigned, being regular registered Masons of the Loog is mentioled gainst our respective names, having the prosperity of the Craft at hear;, are arxious to exect our best endeavours to

promote and diffuse the genuine principles of the art, and for the conveniency of our respective dwellings and other good reasons, we are lesirous of forming a new Lodge to be namer "Lodge of Perseverance." In consequence of this desire, we play for a warrant of Constitution empowering as to meet as a regular lodge at the Swin nn, Dudley, in the County of Worce ter on the last Wednesday of every month, ind there to discharge the duties of masonry in a constitutional manner, according to the forms of the Grder and the Laws of the Grand Lodge, and where nominated and do recommend Brother Alexander Patterson to be the first Master, Brother Ibomas Stevensor, to be the first Senior Warden and Brothe Van es Worley to be the first Junior Warden of the said Lodge. The prayer of this Petition being granted, we promise strict obedience to the commands of the Grand Master and the laws and regulations of the Grand Lodge

THE first meeting of this Lodge was held on Wednesday, 24th of April, A.D. 1850 at the house of Brother Patterson, Swan Inn, High Street, Dudley when the following Brethren were present:—

Brother Alexander Patterson, W.M. Thomas Stevenson, S.W. Matthew Dennison (J.W. 313) as J.W. William Sheppard, S.D. Robert Martin (S.D. 313) as J.D. and Secretary. Thomas Rudd (P.M. 313), P.M. John Shedden (P.M. 313) Wm. C. Robinson Tyler 313 & 824 as Tyler.

The Petition to Grand Lodge applying for a Warrant and the Warrant or Charter from the Grand Lodge of England having been read, the W.M. by the power vested in him, opened the Lodge in due form and with prayer.

A committee was appointed to frame and settle the By-Laws of the Lodge and also to arringe the purchase of necessary Lodge Furnitur, Crhaments and Jewels.

Brother Wm. Sheppard was a ceted Treasurer of the Lodge and Bro. Wm. Fagues Johnson was appointed as Secretary.

Four members of the Harrionic Loa_{2} e No. 313 were proposed as joining member, and seven local gentlemen were proposed as fit and proper persons to become M son's and member, of the Lodge.

It was ilso resolved that B other W. C. Robinson, Tyle: of Lodges 313 and 824 be appointed Tyler.

On Wednesday, 29th of May, 1850 the four brethren, proposed as joining members, were severally balloted for and duly elected, and four of the gentlemen proposed for membership on April 24th, 1850 were also balloted for and declared elected.

Three of them were initiated.

It was proposed that the Consecration of the Lodge should take place on the last Wednesday in June, if convenient to the Right Worshipful Brother Roden, D.P.G.M., or at such another time, as may suit him.

On Wednesday, 12th of June, 1850 a Lodge of Emergency was convened in response to the following request.

We, the undersigned, being members of the Lodge of Perseverance No 838, do hereby request that you will under the power given by the Book of Constitutions p. 61 rule 8 of private Lodge call a Lodge of Emergency for the purpore of ballotting for, and if approved, of initiating Messes. John Williscroft, Junr., James Hemming and Joseph Wythes, roposed and seconded on the 24 in of April 1. st, as they feel anxious to be precent on the Consecration of this Lodge which it is understood will take place on the last Wednesday in the present month. The Prov. Gd. Secretary, pro:tem: made a formal application for the Constitution of the Lodge, for which purpose he read the Petition and Warrant. The minutes of all the previous meetings were read confirmed and signed by the presiding officer and declared regular and valid.

The Brethren of the new Lodge having then publicly signified their approbation of the Brethren named in the Warrant as the first Master and Wardens, the Lodge was opened in the 2nd and 3rd degrees and the Lodge was then constituted and consecrated according to antient form.

The Lodge was resumed in the 2nd Degree and Brother Alexander Patterson was presented and installed into the chair by the Rt. Wor. Brother Roden, D.P.G.M.

From the time of its Inception the Lodge of Perseverance No. 858 regularly mer at the Swan Inn, Dudley until A pril 25th 1955 when its was agreed that in future the Lorge should be held at the Saracen. Fread Hotel, Stone Street, Dudley. On the 25th November, 1157 the following resolution was nade "That it is expedient for the Welfare and Prosperity of this Lodge that it be removed, and that the Swan Inn, the original place of Meeting of this Lodge having been re-erected that it be removed to that house at the earliest convenience." On the 24th February 1858 this removal was effected.

The Lodge was moved for a third time to comply with a request from a number of Brethren living at Halesowen and by consent of Provincial Grand

Lodge, to the Shenstone Hotel, Halesowen on the 30th January, 1861. Here the Lodge continued for twenty five years until 14th December 1886, when it was removed to the Drill Hall, Halesowen, where special accommodation had been provided. After a sojourn of nearly fifty years the Lodge way to be accommodated in a Temple of its own Several schemes had been thought of, in fact a plot of land was purchased in Cobham Road but the great opportunity presented itself when Bro. J. B. Downing expressed his willingness of self." Newfields " to the Lodge. Wor. Bro. V. D. Abbiss, who was Secretary at that time, store screnuously to procure this desirable building and the brethren promised their wholehearted support. Wor. Bro. A. T. Butler was asked to prepare plays for the alteration of the building and for an annexe which would serve as a Temple and also provide adequate dining accom-Eventually the project was completed modation. and on the 8th of October 1935 General Sir Francis L. Davies, D.G. L., Prov.Gd-Master of Worcestershire dedicated he Temple. He congratulated the Lodge upop its great achievement giving a special word of commer dation to the architect Wor. Bro. A. T. Butter, and the builder, Bro. L. Harper, and to all, who had contributed to the success of this project, which would be a permanent Masonic record, worthy of the name of Perseverance.

The By-Laws of the Lodge.

The first business of a Lodge is the preparation of its By-Laws. The Lodge of Perseverance was no exception to that rule, and, although there is no copy available of its first By-Laws it is quite probable that they were identical with those adopted in 1878 when the Lodge met at the Shenstone Hotel, Halesowen. The introduction of those By-Laws said : ---It is absolutely necessary to the good government and well being of every Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons, that strict order and decorum be observed in all matters and transactions relating thereto, and therefore the most perfect attention and willing obedience is earnestly enjoined on every Brother, not only to the Rules and Regulations of the "Book of Constitutions," and the following By-Laws, but also to all commands of the W.M. and Officers of

the Lodge, as becomes true and faithful brethren and members of a Society as ancient honourable, and so justly calculated to promote peace, harmony and good-will, as that of Freemasonry.

By-Law No. 2 stated that no brother shall be eligible for the office of W.M. unless he could open and close the Lodge in the three degrees and perform (at least) the ceremony of initiation to the satisfaction of a board composed of the W.M. and Past Masters of the Lodge.

Portion of By-Law 6 said that a deposit of ten shillings and sixpence should be made by a brother when proposing a candidate for initiation. This deposit to be repaid when the candidate, if successful in the ballot, presented himself for Initiation.

By-Law 9 said that Visiting brethren remaining for the Banquet should pay the same as subscribing brethren, except on their first visit to a Regular Lodge, when they would be treated as guests.

By-Law No. 12 concerned members who may misconduct themselves either during Lodge or hours of refreshment, or refuse to obey the gavel of the W.M. Such offenders should be admonished by the W.M. for the first offence, fined five shillings for a second, and should he repeat an offence for a third time, he should forthwith be excluded from the Lodge and reported to Grand fodge and Provincial Grand Lodge, due notice having been given him of the charge made against bim.

By-Law No. 15 told menabers that they must not at any time divulge or communicate to any person, not being a Mason any proceedings, resolutions, or other business of or transactions in the Lodge. The penalty of such breach of confidence would be as stat d in by-Law 12.

By-Law No. 25 stated that Officers being absent from Regular Lodge should pay fines as follows— W.M. two shillings and sixpence, S.W. and J.W. two shillings, all others, one shilling. These fines to be enforced on the following Lodge night unless satisfactory explanation for absence be given.



Installation Ceremonies.

In the first half of the hundred years the Lodge has been in existence it was not the custom for a Worshipful Master to instal his successor. This work was undertaken by experienced past masters, presumably well skilled in the noble art. They undoubtedly travelled to various Lodges in the Province for this purpose, and it is recorded that <u>Wor.</u> Bro. W. Masefield, P.M. of 313 and 730 and afterwards D.P.G.M., officiated as installing Master of the Lodge of Perseverance on seventeen occasions viz. 1854, '55, '61, '65, '66, '69, '70, '71, '72*, '73*, '74, '75, '77, '78, '79, '80, '81.

W. Bro. W. Waldron on thirteen occasions. viz. 1884, '85, '86, '87, '88, '91, '92, '93, '94, '95, '96, 97 and 1898.

W. Bro. W. Bristow, Sec. and P.M. 313, and later P.Gd.Sec. on seven occasions, viz: —1856, '57, '58, '59, '62, '72*, '73*.

*W. Bro. W. Masefield and W. Bro. W. Bristow shared the work.

Meeting Dates,

From its inception the Lodge had met regularly on the 4t¹ Weinesday in the month until October 28th 1058 when the 4th Tuesday was considered more convenient. The second and only other change was made on November 11th 1879. From that date until the present day the Lodge has continued to meet on the second Tuesday in the month.

Lodge Personalities.

An outstanding personality in the Lodge is Very Wor. Bro. Seth S. Somers whose connection therewith, dates back to September 1887, four years before he was initiated, when as a Lewis, he had the honour of carrying (in company with three other Lewises) the volume of the Sacred Law, on the occasion that Provincial Grand Lodge proceeded in Procession to Halesowen Parish Church, before its meeting for business in the National Schools, Halesowen. He still proudly treasures a Bible, presented to him, to mark the occasion.

He was initiated on 8th December, 1891 and graduated through various offices until he reached the chair. His first office was that of Organist in 1894. In 1895 he filled the offices of Organist and Steward. In 1900 whilst he was Senior Deacon he was appointed Prov. Grand Steward, and in 1904, twelve months after he had occupied the Chair of King Solomon, Prov. Grand Lodge promoted him to

Junior Grand Deacon of the Province. During his mastership he initiated four candidates, passed three, and raised four. His third Provincial rank was that of Prov. Senior Gd. Warden in 1918. In 1922 he gained the distinction of becoming Grand Treasurer and the Lodge acknowledged this signal honour by presenting to him his Grand Lodge Regalia.

In 1921 he was appointed Treasurer of the Lodge an office he still holds to-day.

It can safely be said that V. Wor. Bro. Somers achieved his greatest ambition when he was appointed Provincial Grand Superintendent of the Holy Royal Arch Chapter of the Province of Worcestershire in 1934. His efficiency, coupled with his natural geniality, have gained for him the loyalty and affection of all Holy Royal Arch Masons. May he live long to enjoy his exalted position and guide the destinies of the Province.

Provincial Grand Lodge at Halesowen.

The Lodge of Perseverance has entertained Provincial Grand Lodge on three occasions. The first time was on 14th September 1887 when Sir Edmund Lechmere, Provincial Grand Master accompanied by members of Provincial Gd. Lodge attended Halesowen Church in procession, prior to the meeting in the National Schools. It is recorded that on that occasion four Lewises were entrusted with the honour of carrying the Volume of the Sacred Law. They were Seth Smith Somers (now our Senior Past Master), John Pearson, Samuel W. H. Cookson and George H. Parry, and to mark this unique ceremony they were each presented with a handsome Bible. It is also said that the Prov. Gd. Chaplain, Rev. Wor. Bro. A. B. Timbrell preached an eloquent sermon from the following words:

" All things are double one against another." Ecclesiasticus 42 v.24.

The second visit of Provincial Grand Lodge was on 25th September 1900 and prior to the meeting in the National Schools, Halesowen Wor. Bro. W. T. Page, D.P.G.M., accompanied by the Provincial Officers and the representatives of the Lodges in the Province attended Divine Service in the Larish Church, Halesowen. The Provincial Grand Chaptain Rev. Bro. J. C. Hill, M.A., Rector of Halesowen, preached an eloquent sermon from the words "Ye shall be sons of the Highest "St. Luke M.V.35. The third visit of Provincial Grand Lodge was on September 19th, 1911. It was beld in the Grammar School, Halesowen and the Nr. Wor. B.o. Ceneral Sir Wm. Campbell, P.G.M., presided

Provincial Grand Lodge.

The Lodge of Forstverance was one of the eight Lodges in existence in the Province when Worcestershire was a knewledged by Grand Lodge, as a separate Masonic Province in 1953, with Sir Robert de Cornan as its first Provincial Grand Master. It is to the credit of this Lodge that on six occasions Previncial Grand Lodge has appointed a Past Master as Senior Warden. These appointments were made in

Long Services.

It is interesting to recall that five members have been connected with the Lodge for more than fifty years and have contributed in no small measure to the welfare, harmony and success of the Lodge and their names will be handed down to posterity. The Lodge has recognised the long service of these members, viz. Wor. Bro. Walter Somers (50 years), Wor. Bro. G. F. Grove (56 years), V. Wor. Bro. Seth Smith Somers (58½ years), Wor. Bro. William David Abbiss (51½ years), Wor. Bro. Albert Thomas Butler (52 years).

Wor. Bro. W. D. Abbiss was initiated on the 14th of November 1893 and by regular gradation he eventually became Worshipful Master in 1905. In 1912 he was appointed Secretary of the odge, a position he held with distinction until the time of his death, 22nd May 1944. When the Jodge on Instruction was commenced in 1917 ne was its first Preceptor and continued in this office for 23 years. Provincial Lodge honours were first conferred upon him in 1900 when he was appointed i rovincial Grand Steward. In 1996 he was promoted to Prov. Asst.Grand.Sec. and in 1920 to P.Prov.C.d.Warden. In 1932 he received Grand Lodg, Honours as a Gd.Std.Bearer. The represented the rodge for many years on the Prov J ibrary and Museum Committee, of which he became Vice Chairman in 1932 and Chairman in 1940. He was a Life Governor of the three Malonic Chality Institutions.

Finances of the Lodge.

Although there must have been some means of keeping the accounts of the Lodge there is no record of its financial position for the first two years. Then it was, that the treasurer evidently thought or found it necessary to acquaint the members monthly how much money there was in the coffers of the Lodge. For eighteen months all was well, but a state of emergency then arose, for the Treasurer had to pay for Jewels and Furniture and the amount left in the bank was only 16/10d. More bills had to be paid and three months later he told the Lodge that it owed him £15 9s. 11d. He was paid and in the following month he reported there was then a balance of ± 1 12s. 7d. in the Lodge's favour.

In July 1854 the treasurer reported a credit balance of £19 2s. 8d. but for fifteen years there was no further record. From August 1869 it became incumbent upon the Treasurer to issue a balance sheet at the end of every financial year, and for the next five years no difficulties occurred, then the treasurer reported that there was a debit balance of 15/10d. The Lodge had been called upon to meet heavy financial obligations for when it moved to the Drill Hall, Halesowen in 1886 it bought new furniture, crockery and cutlery without incurring heavy debts, and again when it moved into its new Masonic Hall in 1935 (an undertaking which cost approximately £5000) it was faced with an overdraft at the Bank of about £2000. This was gradually reduced year by year until in 1942 a great effort was made to pay the Bank. The members of the Lodge volunteered to lend £25 or multiples thereof, free of interest. The money was quickly raised, and with the exception of £325 these loans have been repaid. The next scheme to be undertaken was the installation of a new organ, at an approximate cost of £1500, to be known as the "Abbiss Memorial Organ." In this scheme the Lodge was greatly assisted by the other Lodges using the Masonic Hall. It is with a delat of gratitude to the many individual subscriber, that we are able to say that only about one purch of the total outlay remains to be subscribed and it is hoped that the outstanding amount ill soon be liquidated.

The "Abbiss" Memorial Organ.

November 11th 1949 will rand out as a Red Letter day in the long history of the Lodge, when a beautiful Compton Organ was dedicated, consecrated and opened in memory of Wor. Bro. W. D. Abbiss. A very fitting tribute was paid to him by Wor. Pro. F. L. Rose, P.P.G.W., who opened the organ, when he said that as a citizen, a schoolmaster, a Churchman and a Freemason, he had set such a very high standard and worked with such zeal and assiduity, that he had gained the respect and affection of all who knew him and his name would ever be remembered in the annals of the Lodge. Wor. Bro. Ben Marsh, J.P., P.G.D., D.P.G.M. in charge, said that Wor. Bro. W. D. Abbiss had set a pattern for the present generation to emulate, and his devotion to duty and the cause of Freemasonry would be perpetuated by the beautiful organ now installed.

Wor. Bro. J. G. Richardson, P.P.G.Chap., dedicated the organ and Wor. Bro. J. Gilbert Mills, P., 'G.O. gave a recital on the organ after briefly explaining its structure and its range. The organ will be used by all the Lodges using the Temple, and the Lodge of Perseverance wishes to place on record its great appreciation of the generous cupport, giver, by the members of all Lodges meeting, at the Temple

At the next Lodge meeting held on '3t's December 1949 the members of the Lodge Presented to Wor. Bro. A. T. Butler with a silver salver to commemorate his Jubilee in Peen asonry. The Wor. Master, Wor. Bro. R. S. Goodman in maling the presentation spoke in the highest praise of the many acts of kindness and the sound advice which Wor. Bro. Butler had given to the Lodge in the erection of the Temple and the installation of the Organ. A fitting climax to this Ceremony was the request made by Wor. Bro. F. L. Tose that this Lodge should place on record an ceptor, tion of the great services rendered to the Lodge by Wor. Bro. A. T. Butler.

Lodge of Instruction.

Lodge of Instruction commenced February 10th, 1917. There were 13 members present.

Wor. Bro. W. D. Abbiss was Preceptor from February 1917 to February 1940 a period of 23 years.

Wor. Bro. J. Little was Deputy Preceptor from February 1926 to February 1936, a period of 10 years.

Bro. A. S. Walker was the first Secretary, 1917 to 1919, 2 years.


