INTRODUCTION

The Present Collection of Books, Medals, Pottery, Clothing etc. belonging to the Provincial Grand Lodge of Worcestershire owes its inception to the devoted labours of Wor. Bro. George Taylor, Past Grand Standard Bearer, England, and Provincial Grand Secretary of Worcestershire. In 1884 a Masonic Exhibition was organised by him in the Guildhall, Worcester, consisting of items loaned by collectors all over England. Many of the exhibits were Brother Faylor's own property and he continued to add to his collection, which was purchased by the Provincial Grand Lodge of Worcestershire in 1899.

BYE-LAWS

- 1. The Library and Museum shall be under the control of a Committee, consisting of the General Purposes Committee of the Province, (P.G.L. Bye Law No. 6.) with the addition of one representative from each Lodge, or subscribing Mason Body, in the Province, which shall meet at least once in each car. They shall appoint an Executive Committee, with full powers to act, as may be deemed necessary.
- 2. The LIBRARY SHALL BE OPEN (except during the month of July) on Tuesdays and Thursdays, between the hours of 11 a.m. and 1 p.m; on Saturdays from 2.0 p.m. to 4.30 p.m.; and may be inspected at other times by making application to the Librarian.
- 3. No BOOK OR ARTICLE may be removed from the premises without the sanctice of the SUB-COMMITTEE, through the Librarian, who shall keep a book recording all such loans.
- 4. Articles of Masonic interest may be loaned for exhibition purposes to any Masonic body, at the discretion of the Chairman and Librarian.
- 5. Books may be loaned on personal application, or by post, Borrowers may retain books for one month only, and are requested to return them as quietly as possible. If desired to retain them longer, writ en application must be made to the Librarian. ON NO CONSTREATION may books be lent by the borrower to any other per on. There may be other brethren waiting for them Outward pos age will be paid by the Library. BOOKS DATED TRIOR TO 1000 can only be issued by permission of the Chairman and Librarian.

NOTE: The Committee will be pleased to receive gifts or loans of Books, Manuscripts, Medals, Jewels or Masonic Clothing of interest, and undertake to retain in safe custody old Minute Books, Memoranda, Documents etc.
