BY-LAWS

BY-LAWS,

8c. 80

I

ALL By-Laws Rules, Orders, and Regulations, at any All former time or times heretofore made by the authority of this Lodge nulled. for the well ordering and governing thereof, are hereby annulled and made void.

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II.

This Lodge shall assemble on the Second, Fourth, and Days of assistin Friday, (when it shall occur) in every Month, at Seven sembling. o'clock in the Evening precisely, and also on the Twenty-Seventh day of every December, and each Fifth Friday shall be a Master's Lodge, which Assemblies shall be deemed General or Public Lodges. The Worshipful Master, or, in his absence the Senior Warden, may, by virtue of his authority, at any time convene a Lodge, but any Brother or Candidate requiring a Lodge of Emergency shall defray the expense of the same.

III.

Fines for absent Members. If any Member is absent one hour after the appointed time of Meeting, he shall be fined Sixpence, and if absent the whole evening, or time of business, he shall be fined One Shilling; no excuse shall be allowed for non-attendance except in cases of lameness, sickness, or being Ten Miles from Cheltenham. The Treasurer shall be directed to apply for (II) Fines, and if any Brother neglect or refuse to pay the same for the space of Three Months, without assigning to be reason which shall appear satisfactory to the Loage, he shall be summoned to shew cause why he should not be expelled; and if he do not attend, the summons to be repeated, to which if he shall neglect to conform, he shall thenceforth cease to be a Member, and not be allowed even to visit until such Fines be paid, when he may be fully reinstated in all his former rights and privileges.

IV

Fines for absent Of-ficers.

The Master, Wardens, and Secretary, respectively, not attending to open the Lodge at the times appointed, to forfeit Two Shrings and Stepence each, unless it shall appear that such non-attendance was occasioned by sickness, or being three miles absent from Cheltenham.

V.

Every person desirous of being initiated into Masonry in this lodge must first be proposed and seconded in open Lodge by a Member thereof, who shall at the time of such proposition deliver in writing to the Secretary the Christian and Surname, age, profession, and place of abode of such proposed Candidate, and deposit One Guinea in the hands of the Treasurer; a Ballot shall take place at the Lodge immediately following, at which, unless more than one negative appear, the Candidate shall be deemed approved. If a rejection should be the result of the Ballot, the deposit shall be returned to the Brother who made the proposition, but

andidates.

should the Candidate be approved, he may be initiated at the same, or at any subsequent stated Lodge within Three Months, and if he neglect to attend within that period, the Guinea deposited shall be forfeited to the Fund of the Lodge, but if the initiation take place, the money so deposited shall be taken in part of the Initiation Fee.

Note.—Too much circumspection cannot be observed by a Brother who is solicited to propose a Candidate for admission to our mysteries; he will feel the importance of a proper attention to the temper and disposition, as well as the circumstances in life of the person to be proposed, that neither the invaluable privileges of the Order may be conferred on unworthy objects, nor the county and consequence of the Lodge be subject to be impaired a affected by the admission of persons, who, either through wan of wills not similarly bring discredit on it.

VI.

Every person initiated into Majorry in this Lodge, (except serving Brethren made acreeably to the Constitution,) Fee. shall, upon his initiation, but the sum of hix Guineas, which shall entitle him to the three degrees, and include the usual charge for Certificate and registering in the Grand Lodge.

Initiation, Fee.

VII.

Any Proteer having been regularly initiated into Masonry in another Lodge who shall be duly proposed and approved in the Bellot, may be advanced to the second or third degree, and shall pay for each degree he receives One Guinea passed or and an Trail to the Fund of the Lodge. The Certificate of received, his initiation must at the same time be produced.

VIII.

Any Brother desirous of being admitted a Member of this Admission Lodge shall (after he has visited the Lodge once) be proof Members posed by a Member, who shall deposit the sum of One Guinea as Admission Fee, he shall then be ballotted for the ensuing regular Lodge, and unless two negatives appear

shall be admitted, and pay to the Treasurer Two Shillings and Sixpence for registering his name in the Books of the Grand Lodge, together with a proportion of Subscription due on the current Half Year.

Note. - The Brother's Certificate of his Registry in the Books of the Grand Lodge must be produced before he can be received as a Member.-Vide Constitution, p. 88.

IX.

Visiting Fee The Fee of a visiting Brother shall be fixed by a majority of the Brethren present at any sum not exceeding Five Guineas, and in case any Fee shall be required, the ame shall be paid previous to such visitors admission into the Lodge.

Each Member of this lodge shall bay into the hands of Subscripthe Treasurer the snm of One Guinea Half Yearly, which shall be paid in advance, and should any Member be in default of this Article for One Year, he shall be written to expressly by the Secretary, and if not complied with, he shall not be hereafter received even as a Visitor, until he shall have paid up all his arrears.

> -As the obvious tendency of this Law is to secure the credit and dirnit, of the Lodge, and to prevent unnecessary and impradeat cebate, to the imminently endangering its harmony and welfare it is earnestly hoped that no Member will offend against the same.

XI.

Members withdrawing and returning.

tion.

If any Member shall desire to be discontinued as a Member, he must give notice of such his intention, either in open Lodge or by Letter to the Secretary, and upon paying up his arrears, if any, he shall be discontinued accordingly, but such brother shall at any future time, if so inclined, on application for such purpose, and on paying Half a Guinea, together with his proportion of the Half-Yearly Subscription of the current Year, be re-admitted a Member of this Lodge, provided he is approved on a Ballot as in Article Eighth.

XII.

Every Brother who speaks shall rise and remain standing, Regulation addressing himself to the Worshipful Master; if more than for Older one rise at the same time, the Worshipful Master shall name the first speaker. No member shall be allowed to speak twice on the same subject, excepting to reply or explain less the Worshipful Master shall think it expedient, and no Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft, Visiting Broth r or Menber being in arrear, shall presume to speak or vote on any affairs of the Lodge, unless leave be given by the Wershipful Master, or the arrear or arrears be then paid.

XIIIX

The Worshipful Master of this Lodge, for the time being shall have power to relieve any distress d Brother, who may Relief of from time to time apply to him at his place of abode, or direct distressed Brethren the Treasurer to do the same with any sum not exceeding Five Shillings, which shall be charged to the Fund of this Lodge.

Note The utmost disc. imination will be required in discovering the real from preponded objects of Charity; as it is notorious that many work less individuals are constantly travelling the country to plande the liberal and well-intentioned.

XIV.

At the stated Meeting next preceding the feast of St. John the Evangelist, a Master shall be elected by Ballot in the following manner, viz. the Master for the time being, shall Election of inform the Lodge what Brethren are eligible (vide Book of Constitutions, page 77), and the Secretary shall deliver to every Member present the several names of such Brethren written on different strips of paper, each Brother shall then proceed to the Ballot Box by seniority, and put therein the

name of him he most approves, carefully destroying or concealing the other, so that no one else may know the name of the Brother for whom he votes; when all have so done, the Master shall open the Box, and declare the numbers, and whoever appears to have the greatest number shall be duly elected Master for the Year ensuing. Where the numbers are equal, the Master shall have the casting vote, except there be more than two Candidates, in which case such as have equal numbers shall be ballotted for again.

Note. In the choice of a Master it is to be understood that the gualifications of Members, and not merely seniority, are to be attended to, and this Law shall be read immediately preceding such election.

XV

Appointment of Wardens and other Officers. On the Festival of St. John, after the minutes have been confirmed, and the Worshipful Master of the ensuing Year installed, he shall forthwith proceed to appoint his Wardens and other Officers.

XVI

Treasurer and his duty. The Treasurer shall be elected in the same manner and at the same Meeting as the Master. It shall be his duty to hold the carboot the Louge, to discharge, with the approbation of the Master and Wardens, all Bills due, and keep a Bool of Receipts and Disbursements, which shall be open at all times to the inspection of the Lodge.

XVII.

Secretary's

The duty of the Secretary shall be to read the Minutes and enter the transactions of the Lodge on every Night of Meeting, to keep an exact account of all Cash deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, and to write the Summonses in due time to the Brethren.

XVIII.

The Treasurer's Cash Book, the Secretary's Minute Book, and Secretary's Books or any Property, of whatever description, shall, upon no octary's Books

casion be taken out of the Lodge without the consent of the Worshipful Master.

XIX.

The Treasurer's Accounts shall be audited on the Lodge Audit of Night preceding the Feast of St. John the Evangelist by Accounts some two Brethren appointed by the Lodge for that purpose, who shall sign their approbation thereof.

XX.

In order to preserve due decorum and prevent inequalizations in the Lodge, the Master shall, at the Meeting next and their after his Election, and when the Minutes are confirmed and their of the Brethren to act as Stewards, who shall engage punctually and regularly to attend to the duties of their Office, unless prevented by indisposition or urgest business, on notice of which the Master shall appoint two other Brethren to act pro tempore in their stead, the duties of these officers shall be to introduce Visitors and see that they are properly accommodated, and at Festivals to see that the Tables are properly supplied with retreshments, &c. And to render the Office less difficult to the Meeting and more beneficial to the Lodge, it is nereby ordered that no wine, &c. be at any time by ught on table unless by the desire of the Stewards.

No.. Nothing has a stronger tendency to bring the Fraternity into disrepute that the keeping of late hours on a Lodge Night, it is therefore haped that no Member will offend against this Law, so admit any calculated to secure the health of the individual, the ced't of the Craft, and the private economy, on which must be founded the domestic happiness of all families.

XXI.

The Tyler shall also be elected on the usual Election Night, and shall be continued only during his good be-Tyler's duty haviour and the pleasure of the Lodge. His duty shall be to carry out the Summonses to the Members at least I hree Days before the Lodge Night, to guard the door and ex-

ternal avenues to the Lodge, to set out the Furniture, and keep the Property belonging to the Lodge in a clean and neat manner, for which duty he shall be paid for summoning and attending each Lodge

XXII.

Alteration or addition to Laws.

Whenever it shall be found necessary to make any alteration or addition to the Laws and Regulations of this Lodge, such proposed alterations or additions shall be handed to the Master in writing, who shall cause the same to be read by the Secretary, and if it be regularly seconded, it shall be discussed by the Brethren present, and their sense taken thereon by a shew of hands: and if a majority appear in its favour, it shall be entered upon the Minures of the Lodge and notice of such proposed alteration or addition be given in the summonses for the next Lodge, at which it shall be finally debated, and if approved by a majority, it shall be entered and received as a rand of, and equally binding with, any of these Laws and regulations, but nothing shall be binding until it shall have been so moved, discussed, and approved in two successive Lodges.

XXIII.

By-Laws to be signed by Members

A opy of the foregoing By-Laws shall be furnished to each subscribing Member immediately on his admission, for which he shall pay the sum of One Shilling, and subscribe his name to the same in a book kept for that purpose below ging to the Lodge.
