INTRODUCTION.

"ORDER is HEAVEN'S first Law;" and inasmuch as no Society can be conducted without order, so is it equally necessary for good government, that laws for the maintenance of order should be established on a just and equitable foundation.

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The GRAND LODGE OF ENGLIND having in the Book of Constitutions, laid down certain laws and rules for the government of the Order, it only remains for us to enact such By-lays for the regulation and management of our Lodge as the Brethren may judge most expedient.

It is necessary at all times to be remembered, that laws, without enservance, are worse than useless; therefore let all the Officers of the Lodge be treated with that deference and respect which their Offices demand, it being through them, alone, that order and propriety can be maintained. The phore effectually to provide for this, these honourable situations ought to be filled with such persons only as are desirous of promoting the general good.

We must endeavour to avoid, as much as possible, introducing into our mysteries any persons addicted to strife or contaminated by profaneness or dishonesty; thereby showing to the world that

our principles rest on the firm basis of Virtue and Honour, and not on mere forms and ceremonial observance.

Masonry comprehends, within its circle, every branch of useful learning, and stamps an indelible mark of pre-eminence on all its genuine professors, which chance, power, or fortune, cannot be saw.

When its principles are strictly observed it is a sure source of tranquillity among the various disappointments of life: it imparts real and intrinsic excellency to man, and renders him fit for all the duties of society;—it cheers the mind in the hour of affliction, paves the way to peace, and promotes domestic happiness. it is company in solitude, and gives variety, vivacit, and energy to social conversation. These are but a few of its advantages: to enumer to them fully would be an endless task, enough, however, has been said to show that he who sultivates this science, and acts consistently with the character of a Mason, possess es the pring and support of every moral and social virtage.

From this view of the science, its inherent excellence and beneficial tendencies must be obvious. It contains a principle of universality which unites in one indissoluble bond of affection men of the most distant countries, of the most opposite tenets, and of the most contradictory opinions; so that a Mason finds in every nation a friend, and in every country a home.

BY-LAWS.

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ALL former By-laws are hereby repealed.

II.

We acknowledge the supremacy of the UNITED GRAND LODGE OF ENGLAND, and bind ourselves to observe the Laws laid down in the BOOK OF CONSTITUTIONS, issued to the Fraternity by its authority.

MI.

Without order and decorum harmony Irregular cannot be preserved, or the business of Masonry properly conducted, therefore, at the stoke of the Master's hiram, profound silence shall be observed.

If any Brother swear, or say any thing urreligious, obscene, or offensive, hold private committees, dispute about religion or politics, offer to lay wagers, interrupt a Brother while speaking, be not standing when addressing the Master, appear in Lodge unclothed, or otherwise conduct himself improperly, such offending Brother shall be called to order,

and should be continue refractory, or interrupt the business, he shall be peremptorily commanded by the Master to withdraw for the evening, and be subject to a fine at the discretion of the majority of the Brethren present, to which should be refuse to access, he shall receive public censure at the next open Lodge; and should be neglect to attend the Lodge when summoned, or to a sign satisfactory reason for his absence, or prove again refractory, his name shall be erased from the list of Members of the Lodge, and notice to that effect stating his offence, shall be sent to him by the Secretary.

IV.

Members desirous of withdrawing from being distributed the Lodge way do so, on signifying such intencontinued tion, either personally in open Lodge or by letter to the Secretary, and discharging any arrears and his subscription for the current year up to the 27th December, provided he shall not in any way have conducted himself unbecoming a Mason. The question for the acceptance of the resignation must therefore be put for the opinion of the Brethren. But he may be re-admitted on application for that purpose, paying one guinea, and being approved on a ballot after the usual forms.

When any Subscription shall remain un- Application paid for one year, it shall be a standing direction to the Treasurer to make written application for it; if not paid within three months, a second application shall be made; and shuold the subscription be unpaid three months beyond such second application, the name of the party so neglecting to discharge his arrears shall be subject to erasure, at the discretion of the Lodge; and no member shall Member in arbe permitted to vote on any question, or to rear to vote ballot for a new member, or to be appointed pointed to to any office, who has not paid up his subscription.

The Furniture, Organients, Jewels, and Furniture other property of the Lodge, shall be con-vested in sidered as vested in, and actually the property Wardens. of, the Master and his Wardens for the time being, in rust, nevertheless, for themselves and the rest of the Members of the Lodge. They shall not be worn or made use of out of the Lodge, except on special occasions, to be approved by the Master.—A regular inventory of the whole, signed by the Master of the ceremonies, shall be entered in the Book of By-Laws.

VII.

Times of Meeting.

The Lodge shall celebrate the Festivals of St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist, and a Banquet Lodge shall be held on the First Thursday in the Months of February, March, October, and Describer; the Brethren to be summoned at Four o'Clock. An Evening Lodge to be held the Third Thursday in January, February, March, April, October, and November; to commence at Half-past Six o Clock precisely.

VIII

Committee and Auditing Accounts.

The Master shell be empowered, during the incryals of the regular Meetings of the Lodge, to convene a Committee, to consist of the Master and his Wardens and at least two Members of the Lodge, to consider of any special matters; a sum not exceeding Ten Shillings to be allowed for expenses attending each of the said Meetings, from and out of the Lodge Fund. The sum allowed for Auditing the Accounts not to exceed Three Pounds.

Disposal of That no sum of money exceeding the sum Money, &c. of £20., or any order or orders for goods or other purposes of the Lodge to that amount, shall at any time be made, laid out, or given

by the Master, or any other Member of the Lodge, without the previous sanction of the Brethren in Lodge assembled.

IX.

The Master, the Treasurer, and the Tyler Election of shall be elected by ballot, at the regular other Offi-Evening Lodge held in November; at the cers. following regular Lodge the Master shall be installed, and afterwards he shall appoint and invest his Officers.

X.

The Treasurer, on being appointed, shall Treasurer's give such bond for the due execution of his office as shall be required by the Lodge, and shall keep a book with an exact account of the receipts and disbursements, which shall be produced in the Lodge when called for.

The account with the Grand Lodge to be kept separate and distinct, as required by its regulations.

That the Treasurer shall produce annually, at the Evening Lodge next after the Audit, an Abstract of the Receipts and Payments of the past year, together with a Statement of the Amounts due to the Lodge, as well as of its liabilities.

XI.

Secretary's The Secretary shall issue summonses to duty. all the Members for each meeting of the Lodge (at least four days previously), particularly noticing ballots and initiations, stating the names, places of abode, and professions of the candidates, By-laws proposed to be altered, repealed, or made, the number of passings and raisings due, and shall enter all motions and other minutes of the proceedings of the Lodge in a book expressly kept for that purpose.

The Master of Ceremo-

That it be the duty of the Master of the nies' duty. Ceremonies to pay particular attention to the accommodation of Visitors, to see that the Brethren are seated in the Lodge according to their Masonic rank, and that the Lodge Furniture, Ornaments, Jewels, &c., be kept in good order, and in accordance with the Eook of Constitutions.

XIII.

That it be the duty of the Stewards (one of whom shall be permanent) to order the refreshments and attend to the comfort of the Brethren. That, upon ordinary Banquets and Suppers, they be authorised to provide for any number of Brethren not

exceeding one-third of the Members of the Lodge; and, at Festivals on St. John's Days, for any number not exceeding two-thirds of the numbers of Members of the Lodge; but that the Stock of Wine and the supply thereof shall be under the sole direction and management of the permanent Steward, who shall keep the Wine Account and Funds separate and distinct from the other accounts of the Lodge, and report the state thereof at the regular Evening Lodge in March and October.

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XIV.

The Tyler to be under the control of the Tyler's duprincipal Officers, to set out and prepare the muneration Lodge against the appointed meetings, to take care of the Lodge Furniture, to see that every Member signs his name in a book, kept for that purpose, prior to his entering the Lodge; to collect the fees from the Visitors, and deliver the summonses to the Members, for which he shall be paid by the Treasurer three shall be paid by the Treasurer three shall be paid by the Tylers to be paid two shillings and sixpence each.

XV.

When any gentleman is proposed to be Proposition made a Mason in this Lodge, his name, age, profession, and place of abode, in writing, together with One Guinea, shall be handed to the Master by the Member proposing him; the Guinea to be returned in the event of his non-election.

Admission.

The Candidate shall be balloted for at the next Lodge. If approved on the ballot he shall be initiated as soon as possible, on payment of the usual fees of £5. 1s. and 2s. 6d to the Tyler, for the amount of which the Member who proposes him shall be answerable to the Lodge.

XVI.

Operation of ballot.

When a ballot takes place, if one black ball or negative appear in the box, a second ballot may take place the same evening, on a motion being made for that purpose; should one black ball a second time appear, a motion may be made to repeat the ballot at the next Lodge, but if two appear, the ballot must be supended for twelve months.

XVII.

Forfeiture of Proposition Fee.

If a Candidate be approved on the ballot, and do not attend to be initiated within six months, after receiving due notice to that effect, the deposit made at his nomination shall be forfeited, and his election be declared void, unless satisfactory apology be made.

XVIII.

If any Brother be desirous of becoming a Masons not made in Member of this Lodge, who was not made this Lodge. In it, the fee shall be Two Guineas, with Half-a-Crown, the registering fee, to the Grand Lodge. In the case of a Brother not made under the English Constitution, or who has not been subsequently registered as a Member of some English Lodge, the fee shall be £2. 19s.; such additional fees having to be paid to the Grand Lodge, for registering and certificate.

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The proposition shall be ander the same regulations as stated in the 25th By-law—a ballot shall take place at the next Lodge, subject to the regulations stated in the 16th and 17th By-laws, and if approved, the Brother shall be immediately received on payment of the remainder of the fees.

XIX.

Every Member of the Lodge shall subscribe Annual and pay annually to the Treasurer the sum tion.

of One Pound Six Shillings (which includes Two Shillings to the Fund of Benevolence) or such other sum as may, from time to time, be agreed upon in open Lodge, which shall be paid in advance on or before the regular Lodge in January, a receipt for the same to be given by the Treasurer.

XX.

Member withdrawing his Name. Any Member who shall, in open Lodge, desire his name to be erased from the List of Members, shall not be again admitted a Member without a fresh ballot, and payment of One Guinea, and Half-a-Crown for registering fee.

XXI

Visiting Fees. Every Brother visiting this Lodge will be expected to produce his Certificate, and undergo an examination, or must be vouched for by a Member of the Lodge; the visiting fee to be paid to the Tyler previous to admission to the Panquet or Supper.

The majority in any Lodge, on vote, to have the power to increase these fees, should it at any time be judged necessary to do so.

XXII.

Visitors restricted. No visiting Brother shall interfere in the proceedings of the Lodge, unless requested by the Master.

XXIII.

Part of the Lodge Fund shall be appro- Charity. Mask priated to relieve distressed Brethren who may apply to the Master for that purpose; the Treasurer (on receiving his order) to pay the same; the sum not to exceed Three Shillings.

XXIV.

If a Member shall propose any of these Alteration By-Laws to be altered or repealed, or any new one to be added, due nooce shall be given to each Member in the summonces, and a public ballot shall cake place at the next regular Meeting, the Master to have the casting vote should equal umbers appear.

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Every Prother at the time of his initiation Signature shall subscribe his name in token of assent of Byto these By-Laws, and shall be furnished with a copy of the same.
