THE BANNER

The Term MOSAIC refers to a mode of representing objects by the in-laying of small cubes of glass, stone or marble and was much in repute among the Ancients. As the Artist relies for effect on the careful fitting and blending of the tesserae, so is it necessary that every FREEMASON should be enabled to distinguish and appreciate the connection of our whole System and the relative dependency of its several parts. As the prignerally is based on the Circle, the starting place is a C. that being a point from which a M. cannot example a consider as the un-erring standard of TRUTH and CYSTICE, is the Central Symbol. In close contact with the V. of the S.L. are the S. and C. symbolizing the C. and P inciples son which our Order is founded, BROTHERLY LOVE, RELIEF and TRUTH.

The foregoing emblems are superimposed on a pentagon into which is woven the fire-pointed s ar to represent the F.P. of F. The 24 parts into which the encompassing band is divided represent the 24 parts into which the encompassing band is divided represent the 24 parts of the Day and the 12 larger divisions the 12 months of the year. In the latter staces are depicted the 12 Signs of the Zodiac, representing the Constellations and thereby the Heaver's of Celestial Callopy forming the covering of every Freemasons Lodge. The knotted rope performs two functions, to signify the effect of FREEMASONRY in binding its Votaries in Fraternal Unity and to signify the close ties between this Lodge and HARMONIC LODGE, No. 252. The scheme is completed by four range in blematically, to represent the four Cardinal Virtues, PRUDENCE, TEMPERANCE, FORTITUDE and JUSTICE. Thus, guided by the Divine Precepts, we are to adhere to the Principles of the S. and C. and the minimal the F.P. of F. throughout the 24 hours of the Day and the 12 months of the year, in whatever position we are under the CANOPY of HEAVEN, to work together in Unity and allow ourselves to be sommated by the divinguishing characteristics of Ancient Freemasons.

SCORPIO M the Scorpion signifies Hull or Vounding, in a Masonic sense it calls on us to be Cautious and reminds us of the P of our O. SAGIT A JUS ? the Archer is emblematical of Going Forth or that Sympathy which induc us 's extend relief and consolation to our Fellow Creatures in the hour of their affliction. CAPRICO, N v, the Goat rep esents sacrifice or that Virtue which may justly be denominated the distinguishing chr. a. ten. tic of a Treema. on's heart, Charity. AQUARIUS = the Water Bearer signifies Cleansing or the l'orce of Conscience which should keep down all vain and un-becoming thoughts. PISCES X the Fishes represents 'iultitudes of the thousands who range themselves under our banners. As the fishes are correc'ly represented wien inted by a band or cord, one end of which is under the forefoot of Aries, this appropriately complices he Circle by attributing Meekness or Obedience to the majority, symbolically shew that some hust of recessity, Rule and Teach, so others must, of course, learn, submit and obey.
