

MAKING A MASON AT SIGHT.

This purely American custom is a great honour reserved for those who have served their country with great distinction

It is much more demanding for an American to progress through the three degrees than his English counterpart.

It is not sufficient to memorise just a few standard answers

Many hours are spent under instruction and he must show that he has a thorough knowledge of each degree before proceeding to the next.

In "Making a Mason at sight" the three degrees, including full obligations are given in one day. However the answers to the questions for each degree are given for him.
