Items of History from the old Minute Books of St. Paul's Lodge which will be of interest to our visitors.

Extract from "Engraved List of Lodges," by W. M. Bro.
W. J. Hughan, P. M. 70, 151, and 2076, Past
S. G. D. of England, etc., *St. Paul's Lodge.*

The Deputy Grand Master was W. M. of No. 43 in 1731-2

The Hon. John Ward (afterwards Viscount Dudley and Ward (was appointed D. G. M. by Lord Weymouth on April 17th 1735, to which office he was also reappointed in 1733-8 and as Lord Ward, Baron of Birmingham, was placed in Solomon's Chair." Lodge 43 is one of seven senior Lodges in the provinces on the roll of the Grand Lodge of England, and has been known as "St. Paul's Lodge" for upwards of 100 years.

Dedication of the Masonic Rooms, New Street.

Minutes of St. Paul's Lodge No. 45, held at the
Masonic Hall, New Street,
Birmingham, Monday, April 25th, 1870.

The Lodge was opened in due form by the W.M.

The circular convening the Meeting was read.

The Minutes of last Lodge were read, confirmed, and signed.

The Provincial Grand Lodge, having assembled in an adjoining room a procession was formed headed by the Right Worshipful and Right Honourable Lord Leigh, P.G.M. Lord Leigh having taken his seat in the East, the Deputy Provincial Grand Master then consecrated the Masonic Rooms to Virtue, Universal Benificence and Charity according to Ancient Rites, assisted by the W.M. of St. Paul's Lodge, the W.M. of the Faithful Lodge and the W.M. of the Howe Lodge. An oration was then delivered by the Reverend Brother Harris, P.G., Chaplain. The Roll of the Lodges was then called. The Grand Lodge closed with Solemn prayer according to ancient custom. The W.M. then closed his Lodge and a Banquet was held in the Grand Assembly Rooms presided over by Lord Leigh, when in the course of the evening His Lordship proposed the health of the W.M. and prosperity to St. Paul's Lodge, and referred in most eulogistic terms to the pleasant meeting the P.G. Lodge had enjoyed under the Auspices and hospitality of St. Paul's.

The ROYAL ARCH CHAPTER affiliated to St. Paul's is the CHAPTER OF FORTITUDE NO. 43, which is the eighth oldest Chapter on the Register of Grand Chapter, and its Warrant dates back to 1733.
