LODGE GLITTERING STAR No. 322 IRISH

LODGE No. 322 IRELAND

While at KILKENNY, IRELAND, a Warrant, No. 322 from the Grand Lodge of Ireland, dated 3rd of May, 1759, was issued for a Masonic Lodge in the Worcestershire Regiment. Except for two or three occasions when the Lodge went into suspended animation one to world wars, it has remained an integral part of the Regiment ever since.

THE KNIGHT TEMPLAR DEGREE

Phillip Crossle, the distinguished Masonic historian and writer of child has stated that brethren from "Glittering Star" were responsible for the introduction of "Templar Masonry" in Halifax, Nova Scotia, in 1765.

TRAVELLING ABROAD

The Regiment and its Lodge served in Canada from 18.7 at Montreal, Kingston and London, later in Toronto and finally in Halifax, from which it embacked on October 1868 for Jamaica. The Regiment has since served with great distinction in various parts of the Empire and Commonwealth. The two Great Wars add at imperishable laurels to those already won. Following that, it was stationed in India where Lodge No. 322 carried on the glorious traditions of the apron and the sword.

THE TOWER OF LONDON

On June 3rd, 1938, Lodge Glittering Star held the first and only Masonic Lodge meeting in the Tower of London. The First Battalian of the Worcestershire Regiment was then in Garrison in the Tower At that time Field-Marshal Sir Claud Jacob, G.C.B., was Constable of the Tower and Colonel of the Regiment. He was also a Past Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of England, and an Honorary Member of "Glittering Star." A special medal was struck to commemorate the meeting. On that occasion Bro. Rt. Hon. the Earl of Donnughmore, M. W. Grand Master of Ireland, opened the Lodge, and was supported by the presence of P.O. Rt. Hon. Lord Saltoun, P.G.M.M. of Scotland, and Bro. General Sir Francia Davies, Deputy Grand Master of England.

BICENTEN RY

In June 1959 the Lodge celebrated its Bicentenary at an installation meeting at "Norton Berracks", Norcester, attended by the Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Ireland, the Assistant Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of England and a Past Grand Master Mason of Scotland. Over 350 brethren were present.

FREEMASONRY IN THE FORCES

Of the nine thousand or more Masonic Lodges spaced around the world, there are only five "Travelling Lodge" (Lodges attached to Army Regiments) left.

It is a matter of conjecture the part to be played by Freemasons in general, and Lodge Glittering Star in particular, in the Armed Forces of the Crown. May I conclude these few short items of the history of the Lodge, by quoting from a letter written to the Commanding Officer of the 1st Battalion in 1948.

"It is certain that any organisation which had had connected existence within the Regiment for nearly 200 years, must be an Influence for Good."
