THE PRAETORIAN GUARD

Origin

The Latin word *praetor* means 'he who goes before', hence a leader. Formerly a military title as far back as the fifth century BC, it came to be the designation of one of the most important magistracies in the Roman system of republican government. The term *Cohors Praetoria*, literally 'troops of the leader', existed by the beginning of the second century BC and designated firstly those officers on the staff of the commander and then, as these expanded in number, the general's bodyguards - for example, the personal staff of Scipio Aemilianus in the middle of that century amounted to some 500 men.

Foundation

It was in 27 BC that the first emperor, Augustus, created a permanent corps of these cohorts, stationing them around Rome and placing them under his direct personal contrained. There were at first nine such cohorts, each originally of 500 but later of 1000 again three in Rome itself and the other six in adjacent towns. They served a double in citical as the imperial bodyguard, and with one cohort dressed in civilian clothes and acting as the Emperor's orderlies at his palace on the Palatine. In time of need they could also serve as an additional police force for the city.

History

In 2 BC Augustus relinquished direct personal control a pointing two prefects (of Equestrian rather than Senatorial rank) to command the Prae priates; but this dual control did not last for long. On the accession of Tiberius in 14 AD Sejanus became juint Prefect with his father, but two or three years later took sole command. An ambiguous man and with aspirations of succeeding the emperor, he fostered personal loyalty among the Guard and in 23 AD succeeded in concentrating all nine cohorts in coloristic can still be seen. Demise

After Diocletian's reorganisation of the empire in 293 and the imperial rivalry to which it led, Constantine determined to put a stop once and for all to any source of potential threat. Accordingly, in 312 and after a chequered career of nearly three and a half centuries, the Praetorian Guard was disbanded for good.
