THE LOVING CUP CEREMONY

Since the Charter Warrant of the Lodge was granted in 1913 the Loving Cup ceremony has been an integral part of the Aftemeeting. Its purpose is to honour the memory of the founder of Bristol Grammar school, Robert Thorne.

The Ceremony is performed by the Worshipful Master, his Wardens, and an invited "Old Boy of the School". Each sings one verse of the School Song, in Latin, with the Lodge Brethren joining in for the Chorus.

This is followed by the Toast to Robert Thorne for which the Master and Wardens drink from a silver chalice. No matter how full the chalice may be it is tradition, since time immemorial, that the Junior Warden drains the chalice and prove the same by inverting the chalice over his head!

A BRIEF HISTORY OF BRISTOL GRAMMAR SCHOOL

The "Grammar Schole" over the Frome Gate was in the care of its first schoolmaster Thomas Moffat, when good fortune stepped in to secure its future. The Thorne family were wealthy Bristol merchants, friends of men like John Cabot and known to royalty. They wished to endow a school where the sons of Bristol merchants and tradesmen could receive a good education before settling down to the important business of making money.

On 17th March 1532, Henry VIII issued a charter under which the Thornes could endow the "Grammar Schole" and establish it in larger premises at St Bartholomew's Hospital, near the bottom of Christmas Steps (in one of the oldest parts of the City of Bristol). There the School remained, with the Corporation of Bristol as its Trustees, for over two hundred years, instruction, the boys in Latin, Greek, Divinity and some Hebrew.

By 1767 the buildings were too small and cramped but fortunately the Master, Chorles Lee, have influence with the Corporation of Bristol. He persuaded them that The Grammer School should be allowed to exchange premises with the other City School - Queen Elizabeth's Hospital - which had a pleasant new site in Unity Street, further up the hill. This exchange was carried out and Charles proceeded to enjoy his new School by greatly reducing the mumber of brivs. He had a duty to accept any middle class Bristol boys whose parents wished to encode a Classical education, but he persuaded all too many parents that Latin and Greek were not the best preparation for business life. Eventually he was left with only one pupil, knows in the City as Lee's Chick.

The school was set to rights in 1812 but education viac moving away it on the classics and this caused further problems which were aggravated by you another misuitable headmaster, inappropriately named Goodenough.

In 1848 the Grammar School received a new Scheme and prospered to such an extent that the decision was taken, under the Rev. Joi in William C dicout to move the school to the pleasant and rural site at Tyndall's Park, furth ar up the hill. The first buildings were the Big School, with its remarkable Great Hall (originally a ceaching from and still with it's Masters stalls in situ) on the East wall of which is Caldia and portrait and the Headmaster's House, a modest dwelling which is now the Lower School. The School graw rapidly on its new and healthy site and further classrooms were added togother with a Gramalum, a Fives Court and a Rifle Range. These have since been rebuilt as art rooms and the hearsal rooms but the Winterstoke wing still houses the Laboratories view of the readed doin 1914.

The Preparatory Tchool begain in 1900 and moved into its own building adjoining the Grammar School in Elfon Reid in 1922. On the night of 24th November 1940 the Prep School, together with a laipe portion of central Bristol, was destroyed by incendiary bombs, but luckily the Prep Hall survived the branching and is now the Mackay Theatre. The Elton Road ruins were rebuilt as classrooms under the leadership of John Garrett who later added the University Road buildings and began to colonise the other side of Elton Road. Since then the School has built yet more classroom accommodation together with a new Sports Hall; Art and Music have their own Elton Road Houses and the former playing field is now the Technology Centre

Bristol Grammar School is now a modern, coeducational, independent day school with over one thousand pupils and one hundred staff all of whom can be accommodated in Caldicott's Great Hall.

The Robert Thorne Lodge wishes to thank the School for the use of its facilities today. Likewise the Province of Bristol records its thanks to the School for providing similar facilities for Provincial Grand Lodge Meetings.
