Prov. G.M. of the Combined areas of
Worcestershire, Herefordshire and
Shropshire 1753-1756.

Born: 1700

Died: 1756.

Will: dated 8th April 1755
proved 20th April 1756 by
Charles de Cornwall Esquire,
sole executor and witness
of deceased.

The will describes Sir Robert de
Cornwall as Baronet of Berrington
Castle, Co: of Hereford.

The beneficiaries are:

Elizabeth Hooper, widow,
who receives The Straw

House, in the village of Morwen, in
the Parish of Eye.

Property held during her life time
^{to be}
Then held by her daughter Anna
Spender.

"In recompence for the great care
she hath taken of me during the
time I have stayed at her house".

After decease I give this property
~~and the residue of the estate passes~~
to nephew Charles de Cornwall
who is also the residuary
legatee.

A Hall answer:-

- (a) Relationship with Cornwall & Burford.
- But no evidence in Burford Parish Register.
- (b) That Sir Robert de Cornwall lived at Bemerton House, Teabury.
- This is erroneous. He lived at Bemerton Castle - Bemerton and Teabury.
- (c) That his father was a Welsh Admiral who had been given a baronetcy but had failed to pay the necessary dues in that George II confirmed the award.
- (d) That Sir Robert represented Lancashire in Parliament for 7 years.
- (e) That Sir Robert's nephew was Charles Wulfram de Cornwall who became Speaker of the House.
N.B gives Charles Wulfram (Cornwall 1735-89) - Speaker of House of Commons is only son of Jacob Cornwall of Bemerton, Herefordshire.

Cornwall, Charles (1669—1718)

Son of Robert Cornwall, Bemington, Herefordshire
Navy 1683 (who died 1703) — 1708.

Member of Parliament, Bewdley 1709-10
Woblesley 1712-1718

Advanced to Vice-Admiral 1717-18.

Died Lisbon 7 Oct 1718

Left, among other children, a son
Jacobs, (the father of Captain Woeran
Cornwall, (q.v.)

His younger brother was Frederick (d. 1748)
Vicar of Broadfield for 46 years. He
was father of Captain Frederick
Cornwall R.N., father of Follett H.W.
(Cornwall, (q.v.))

Part I. Chapter I

- that "Sir" Robert de Cornwall was the first P.G.M. in 1753 during the
mastership of Lord Canyfote (John, 1st
Lord Canyfote - G.M. 1752-3 and 1778)
- that he took no active interest in the
Province.
- that he presided at the Annual
Communication of G.L. in Nov of the
year Gloucestershire became a
Province and is described with
Constable in 1756 a P.G.M. of the
5 Counties (Glouc, Wors, Herefords,
Monmouth, Shropshire)
- "Sir" Robert de Cornwall was

descended from Richard de
Cornwall, illegitimate son of

Richard, Earl of Cornwall, second
son of King John — and a brother of Henry III
(1216 - 1272)

The Cornwalls were titular Barons
of Denbigh and by reason of the
fact Robert appears to have assumed
and was conceded the style of
Baronet; without a clear claim to the
rank.

His nephew, who succeeded to the
estates became Speaker of the House of
Commons, while Wolfram Cornwall
did not use the prefix.

When "Sir" Robert was appointed
P.C.M. he was an M.P. for
Lancaster.
