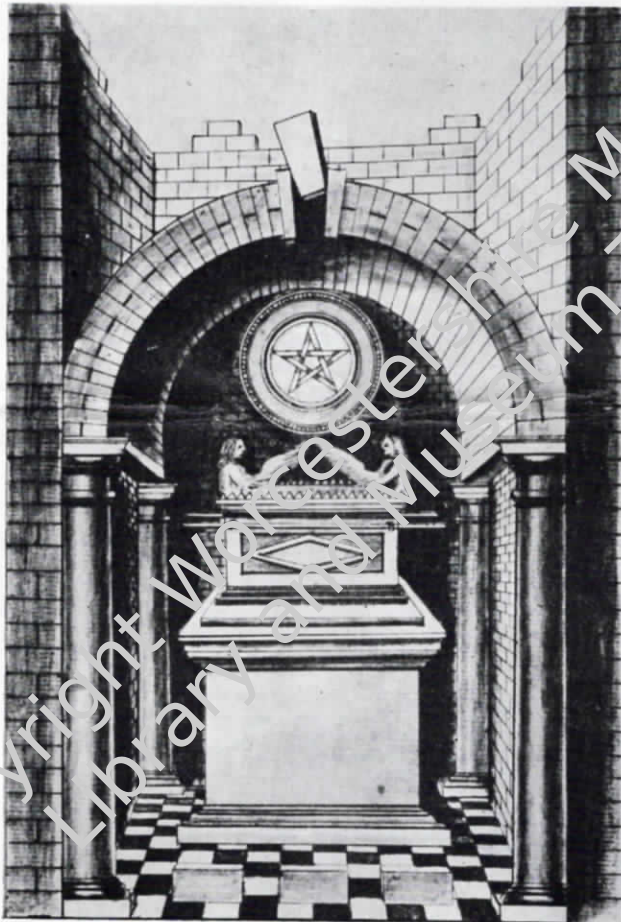

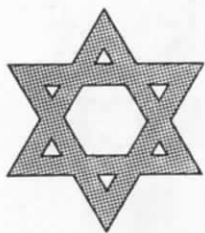

THIS BOOK IS INTENDED to meet the needs of the Royal Arch Mason, as the author's *Freemasons' Guide and Compendium* met the needs of the Craft Mason.

It is a plainly worded, comprehensive, and to the greatest extent it can be, an authentic account of the history and lore of the Royal Arch. The book's strong point is that it is not only historical, but also explanatory of everything in Royal Arch Masonry that can be openly discussed.

Based on up-to-date research, it has a scope wider than that of any other known book. The opening sections introduce the reader to the first mention of the Royal Arch idea, and trace its growth until its general adoption rather later than half-way through the eighteenth century as an accepted degree. These early sections contain much matter that will be new to all but the well-read and serious student.

Later chapters explain the very considerable effect on the fortunes of the Order brought about by the existence of two strong Grand Lodges in opposition to each other. They tell the story of the coming of the first Grand Chapter in 1706, and explain how, in due course, the competing bodies made peace and were united.

The birth of the present Supreme Grand Chapter is related, attention drawn to the place which York Masonry had in the masonic scheme, and the rise and derivation of familiar masonic terms are explained. Sections of great interest go fully into the traditional history of the Royal Arch, particularly in its relation to the Old Testament, and to the ancient legends peculiar to the Order but whose origins are seldom familiar to the ordinary Mason. The subject of the Ineffable Name, its history and significance, has been appropriately treated.

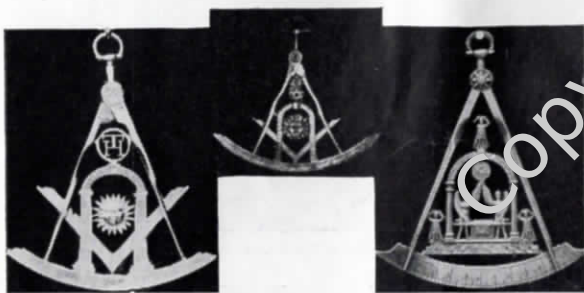
A group of sections towards the close of the volume deals with the growth and development of ritual, and there are many sections on Symbolism and related subjects. In the final sections the clothing and the Jewels of the Royal Arch are discussed, and references are made to the many beautiful plates. A 16-pp. index adds encyclopaedic value to the work.
