### The Kano Lodge Story

This ancient walled city of Kano had long been an important post for the caravans which crossed the Sahara. It was not until after the First World War that a more sophisticated trade brought a small community of foreign traders to set up a township outside the City walls.

By 1927 the township had grown and a number of Government officers, Army personnel and Traders who were Masons met together and decided to form a Lodge in Kano. The only Lodges in the north at that time were at Kaduna and Zaria. Visiting those Lodges involved a long and tedious journey over not very good roads, or a hot and dusty journey by train. A Lodge in Kano obviously would have decided advantages. Of this group of Masons, Bro. (later W/Bro.) Fern was, perhaps, the most active and enthusiastic. It was due largely to his efforts that St. George's Lodge, Lagos, of which he was a member, agreed to sponsor the potition.

In November, 1927, the Charter of the Lodge was granted. Plans for the building of the Temple had been prepared by Bro. Fern but a delay in the securing of the Conficate of Occupancy meant that the land was not available until about two veers before the date fixed for the Consecration meeting. Nothing quanted, again under the supervision of Bro. Fern, by the appointed time a floor had been laid, walls built and roof trucks in position. Tarpaulins were borrowed from the Railway to serve as the roof and lighting was supplied by latteries borrowed from the Boat train which had, that day, arrived in Kana.

The Parquet was held in a firm's trading shed beside a railway siding, a Restaurant car was shunted into the siding and the Banquet are deform the restaurant car by Railway catering staff.

Good forward planning ensured that Lodge furniture and regalia were ready for the Consecration Ceremony. The chairs and pedestals of the three Principal Officers were designed and presented by Bro. Fern. Most of the cost of materials and labour for building the Temple were provided by the members themselves — only £250.00 was eventually paid out of Lodge funds.

At the Consecration of the Lodge on Saturday, 12th March 1928 the District Grand Master, the Rt. Wor. Bro. Gray performed the duties of Worshipful Master. He was assisted by:

The District Grand Waster installed W.Bro. Gaskin into the Chair of King Solomon, but the Officers of the Lodge were not invested until the second coular meeting. A gavel, made from the timber of Kilwinning Abbey, was presented to the Lodge by Kilwinning Lodge.

During the Lodge's first year of existence it suffered two nisfortunes: shortly after the completion of the Temple the area was struck by a severe tornado which removed the roof "in toto" and deposited it some two hundred yards or so away. Later, the Lodge was broken into and all the regalia stolen.

The members were faced with other difficulties in the first two years of its existence. W.Bro. Gaskin, the first Master, was not resident in Kano and was able to attend only two or three meetings. His successor, W.Bro. Gillmor, went on leave after his first meeting and, because of an unexpected transfer, did not return to Kano. However, the monthly meetings continued largely due to the co-operation of W.Bro. Adams of Zaria Lodge, who travelled to Kano as often as he could to conduct the meetings. Whenever he was unable to travel the business of the meeting was conducted from the Senior Warden's chair by Bro. Fern. On such occasions, of course, no ceremonies could be carried out. During those first two years nine candidates were initiated into the mysteries and the privileges of Freemesonry. During the next two years another six candidates including Mr Ralph Edward Wooff were initiated, the last-named on the 14th March, 1931.

At an Emergency Meeting held on the 12th July, 1930, a change in the Bye-Laws was approved resulting in meetings being in lo every month of the year. At the Regular Meeting held on the 9th August, 1930, a Notice of Motion was given that a Lodge of Instruction be formed under the sponsorship of Kano Lodge. However, no further mention is recorded until the 56th Regular Meeting held on the 12th May, 1934, when the Worship of Master commented on the poor attendance at the Lodge of Instruction pointing out to the Brethren the advantages of attendance at such Lodges of Instruction. The purchase of the Lodge Seal was also approved at this meeting.

The Temple was eventually supplied with electricity in time for the meeting of the 13th March, 1931, the date on which Mr (Later R.W.Bro.) P. S. Wooff vas initiated.

At the 15th Regular Meeting held on the 8th April, 1933, Bro. Turnball presented a Banner to the Lodge. The District Grand Chaplain dedicated the Lodge Banner during the same meeting.

The following years were ratherlean years, few candidates seeking admission.

At the Regular meeting held on the 13th August, 1938, only two members of Kano Lodge were present; the remaining offices were all taken by visiting Brethren with W.Bro. Clinton of Normern Nigeria Lodge in the Chair. (W.Bro. Clinton was later elected an Holograpy Member of Kano Lodge.)

During the War years, in spite of restrictions, there were usually good attendances at meetings and fifteen candidates were initiated. The Lodge, because of its geographic position, was happy to welcome many visiting Brethren passing through Kano or posted temporarily to Kano; a tradition of hospitality laid down by the Founders and maintained throughout acceeding years. A rather interesting side-line was that, because of import restrictions, members were thrown on their insenuity to make their aprons etc from local materials.

A Lodge library was inaugorated by the District Grand Master at the Regular Meeting held on the 10th August, 1940 when he presented to the Lodge Waite's "Encyclopaedia of Masonry".

After the Second world War development in Kano accelerated. New industries counted up and an International Airport was constructed. No longer the end of the caravan route, Kano became the main entry and cut point for people travelling between Nigeria and Europe. Conditions, too, were favourable for expansion in the Lodge membership. During these years, W.Bro. Wooff gradually rose through various District Offices until his Installation as District Grand Master in 1954. At the 287th Regular Meeting held on the 8th August, 1953, W.Bro. Vicinanza was initiated; W.Bro. Akle was initiated on 14th July 1956; and W.Bro. Johnson on the 14th September 1957.

In March, 1956, a special Banquet was held to celebrate the Silver Jubilee of R.W.Bro. Wooff — 21 years of Masonry; a most energetic and helpful member of the Lodge; even at the meeting before the Banquet he was checking the Brethren on the correct steps and signs and on the Sign of Reverence! No doubt his efforts and insistence on perfection laid down the foundations of the high standard of the working of the ritual associated with the Lodge. And, perhaps, it is because of this high standard and insistence on correct ceremonial procedure that eventually led to another initiate of the Lodge attaining the Chair of District Grand Master for Nigeria. R.W.Pro. Trevor Elmore was initiated into this Lodge at the 379th Regular Meeting held on 8th April, 1961, although the Minutes of that particular meeting are missing from the Minute Pools! He was installed as District Grand Master in December, 1970.

The life of Kano Lodge has been punctuated by visits of a run ber of Masonic V.I.P.s; Col. Adams representing the Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution; the Assistant Crand Master in 1954; and again, in 1963 the Assistant Grand Master visited Kino but was not able to visit the Lodge. He did, however, the Brethren at the house of the Worshipful Master W. Bro. Akle. And, of course, we have not been neglected by hest coession of District Grand Masters.

Apart from the many visiting Brethren, we have not been without a few unwelcome visitors. The Lodge was broken into in June 1957 and various items, including some of the Working Tools were stolen. Again, we suffered another, but much more serious break-in on the 2nd October, 1966. Concerning this, there is an entry in the Lodge Minutes Book:

"On 2 October, 66 rioters broke into the Lodge and ransacked it, doing serious damage. Owing to this and to the dangerous situation still obtaining on 8 October 1966, the 445th Regular Meeting fixed for that evening was held"

The 445th Regular Meeting was subsequently held on 12th November, furniture and regalia being very kindly boned by our neighbours, the Aggrey Lodge (S.C.). (A ford chis 1 left behind by the rioters is a historical possession and has been or amented with a small brass plaque.) The Lodge, with its usual resilience and capacity for survival, recovered and soon had its furniture and regalia (including that of the Royal Arch Chapter) brought out from the UK.

During 1974/75 the two great pullars were constructed and erected in the East—the cooperative evert of several of the Brethren. A new Banner was decorated and presented (in absentia) by W.Bro. André Bassou to replace the Broner originally presented by Bro. Turnbull, and law root.

Then, in June, 1977, the Lodge had the honour of hosting the Half-Yearly Communication of District Grand Lodge — a splendid and impressive gathering. This was followed by an excellent Banquet at the Davla Hotel.

The story of Kano Lodge is an excellent example of inter-Lodge cooperation and of the International aspect of Masonry. Brethren from neighbouring Lodges have rallied round in times of adversity to ensure our survival and to them all we owe a great debt of gratitude. It is good to note that, just as Zaria ensured our survival in our early days, Kano Lodge is now repaying its 'debt' in helping to resuscitate Zaria Lodge by sending officers to take acting offices at their Regular Meetings.

As we have seen, Kano Lodge was started as an act of faith, helping to close a gap in the world-wide chain of Masonry. It seemed a larger world in those days, fifty years ago, and the Founder Masons must have benefited greatly from their regular meetings, and the opportunity of working the Craft. Their tenacity and entbusiasm helped them to overcome the many difficulties they encountered thus laying down a worthy tradition. We can but salvate them by seeing that the Lodge continues in their footsteps; by maintaining their high standards of working and hospitality; and above all, living by our true Masonic principles.

After opening in the 3° the R.W.Bro. Trevor Elmore District Grand Master, accompanied by District Grand Officers was admitted. Salutations were given and received in the usual manner.

W.Bro. Purdy referred to the booklet which had been published to commemorate the 50th Jubilee of the Locke and followed by narrating various events of interest which had occurred during the 50 years.

W.Bro. read the Minutes of the First Regular Meeting of the Lodge held on 12th March, 1928 — the Consecration of the Lodge. He then proceeded to read out a few random extracts and comments drawn from early Minutes of the Lodge.

Until the Meeting he'd on 14th December, 1935, the Minutes were all signed by the W.M., and the Senior and Junior Wardens — a practice which has never been revived.

There are quite a number of records of two ceremonies being conducted in one evening, sometimes involving three candidates:

eg, two Passings and one Raising

two Initiation; and one Raising.

This may have been thought necessary to build up the numbers and possibly to overcome the fact that for part of the year meetings were not held.

On 21st October, 1929, occurred the first Official Visit to the Lodge when the D. Dist. Grand Master was received with due ceremony. After the Meeting's business, he offered certain comments which, however, were not recorded in the Minutes.

Lodge Meetings were often composed more of visitors than Members. On 14th December, 1929, a particular vote could not be taken because there were not sufficient members to form a divorum. This, incidentally, was the first mention of the election of a Lodge representative for the Freemasons' Hospital & Nursing Kome (later to be known as the Royal Masonic Hospital). The first recorded donation to the Hospital from Lodge Funds was of 10 guiness of 8th February, 1930.

It seemed to be fairly common practice to continue with Lodge business during the temporary absence of the Candidate. This has now been discontinued.

The "ceremony" of Calling Off and Calling On is first recorded in the Minutes of an Emergency Meeting on 31st March, 1931. (Although the Lodge w. Called On during the Ceremony of the Consecration of the Lodge; Calling On was not recorded.

Wiring of the Lodge and fir al connection with the power supply was completed by 10th March, 1932 — providing material light for the Candidate for initiation (Mr R. E. Wooff).

We have always been proud of the fact that, in spite of their many districtions, our early predecessors kept the Lodge Meetings going. Unfortunately the record was spoilt one year when the August and September Meetings were not held in the absence of the Worshipful Maste. At the October Meeting, the W.M. pointed out that the business of the Meetings could have been conducted from the West and that the Meetings need not have been cancelled.

At the Banquet following an Installation it was interesting to note that there was a programme of music featuring, among others, Tommy Handley (a well-known English comedian of the 1940s; Layton and Johnstone, piano duettists; and Jack Hylton and his Band!

A final point of interest; in November, 1949 the Kano Royal Arch Chapter, sponsored by the Jos Royal Arch Chapter, was consecrated by the District Grand Superintendent, Ex. Companion G. M. Gray who, as Dist. G.M. had consecrated the Lodge.

And now to Charities, and collections. A sign of the increase in number and affluence of the Lodge has been reflected in the size of the offertories. In the early days collections varied between 18/- and £1 4s 0d. They gradually increased over the years. The Minutes of the 579th Regular Meeting held on the 11th February 1978 records collection exceeding \$\frac{3}{2}\$1.00.

Donations to Charities both by the Lodge (Masters' Charities) and individual members have also reflected the charitable feelings of the members.

On 9th July 1932 a Masonic Charities Association was formed but there is no further record in the Minutes.

(Now, the Lodge is a Founding Lodge (1956) and Grand Patron of the F.N.H.; Patron, Lodge of the R.M.B.I., R.M.I.B., R.M.I.G., and Vice-Patron Lodge of the R.M.H. Redevelopment and Modernising Fund.)

At one time, Certificates as Vice-Patrons etc were presented to qualifying members in Open Lodge but this practice no longer exists. Finally, as will be seen from this brief history, that, although times change, costs change and people change the Lodge has continued to grow in stature and reputation. It must remain our duty to our predecessors to build on the sure foundations laid by them by insisting on a high standard in our ceremonies and maintain that ever-present spirit of fellowship and service.

The spirit of service has been well exemplified by the great and unt of work carried out during the past two or three years to improve conditions in the Temple, Banqueting Room and kinches — all the to the combined efforts of enthusiastic and dedicates members of the Lodge. To them we offer our sincere thanks and we nope that their efforts will be recorded in posterity.

Greetings and few apt comments from Valt District Grand Master, R.W.Bro. R. E. Wooff and congratulations and greetings from Bro. Alf. Hargreaves were read to the members.

At the appropriate part of the proceeding the R.W. Dist. Grand Master greeted the Werehipful Master and Brethren and commented on the History of the Lodge prepared by W.Bro. Purdy. He congratulated the W.M. and Chricers on the ceremony, and the Lodge in general on attaining its Colden Jubilee. He stated that both the W.M. and B.o. Stewart were fortunate to be so involved on such a historic occasion.

After opening in the 3° the R.W.Bro. Trevor Elmore, District Grand Master, accompanied by District Grand Onicers was admitted. Salutations were given and received in the usual manuar.

W.Bro. Purdy referred to the booklet which had been published to commemorate the 50th Jubilee of the Lodge and blowed by narrating various events of interest which had occurred during the 50 years.

W.Bro. read the Minutes of the First Regular Needing of the Lodge held on 12th March, 1928 — the Consecration of the Lodge. He then proceeded to read out a few random extracts and comments drawn from early Minutes of the Lodge.

Until the Meeting beld on 14th December, 1935, the Minutes were all signed by the V.M., and the Senior and Junior Wardens — a practice which has never been revived.

There are quite a number of records of two ceremonies being conducted in one examp, sometimes involving three candidates:

eg, wo Passings and one Raising we Initiations and one Raising.

This may have been thought necessary to build up the numbers and possibly to overcome the fact that for part of the year meetings were not held.
