our last meeting Mar: 12th 1823 = I must now
be rather an egotist, by me & thro' me, we always
kept our payments up to the Cumberland School, and
Charity Fund - the last payment that I mentioned was
Fifteen Guineas to Mr. White Esq^r - I am the only
surviving Number - the Books, & Constitution, I am
in possession of - the furniture of the Chairs, are
most superb - far superior to y^r Mat the G. L. as
I have been often told by a dear good friend & Brother

the late Walter Roswell Wright Esq. will know in the
C. S. Dr. Pittman if he has been alive I should not have
worried a friend - but perhaps the Great Architect of the
Universe have raised you up to supply his place -
but be that as it may, to his Decease wife I bow
with humble reverence - The Furniture is at the
Sister Bells Inn Bury for expense for a Lodge debt
of about £200

present - if you want more, favor me with a letter
the smallest assistance from the C. S. This You
will be thankfully and gratefully received - I
cannot say more unless it be most gratefully rec'd:
we have eight of us late this winter have been
living at 12/- weekly - living so - hardly existing -
I can get no employment here - I have a piece
of ground that I garden - last summer I made
a few pence by selling a few spare Eggs &
Potatoes & I do all the work myself - I hope the
summer will be more productive - God God:
I can hardly fancy I am what was once G.W. - to
be thankful for the sale of a halfpenny cabbage -
& my Relations - but shame on them -

We are truly sorry to hear of poor Mrs. Pitts'
Ill health - if Mrs. Wright had the means of paying her back
here, she would come & nurse her, as she is certain she could
make her well - another curse upon poverty - not ever able to
administer comfort and care for her those we love & respect -
our most kind & affectionate regards to her - how is Frederic,
how is yourself? favor me with a long letter - my pecuniary
concerns I leave to your Providence - you kind wife will
ever strive to be deserving of - May the Almighty God, bles.
You and Yours is the prayer of your sincere friend
