“CHARITY JEWELS.”

“A Charity Jewel shall be presented in Grand Lodge, by the Grand Master, to every Brother who may serve as Steward at the Festival which is held annually, and contribute a minimum donation of £5 5s. to the Funds. Every additional Stewardship shall entitle the Brother to a Bar.”—See BOOK OF CONSTITUTIONS (Art. 210).

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FESTIVAL STEWARDSHIP.

Every Brother accepting the office of Steward is called upon to pay a Fee (settled by the Stewards themselves) usually £2 2s., to "The Stewards' Fund," *separate from the Benevolent Fund*, and for which he receives his Dinner Ticket, Stewards' Badge, &c.; the balance being applied to the necessary expenses of the Festival, such as Music, Printing, Postage, &c.

Brethren will wear Mark Collars and Jewels at Dinner.

Tickets, 21s. each.

Ladies' Tickets are issued at 15s. each. Bonnets may be worn or not, at pleasure.

The Rule with respect to votes is as follows:—

Every Donor who subscribes £5 5s. to the Fund, is entitled to Five Votes at each Election of Male and Female Annuitants, and of Pupils on the Educational Branch; or should he subscribe £10 10s., to Twelve Votes at each Election.
